Headmaster's Report



We commenced the year again with an enrolment of a little over 1,100 students, a very similar number to our previous record enrolment. The success of last year's completion of our new boarding facility could be seen in the fact that our Boarding House was full from the beginning of the year, with an increased capacity. We were very close to capacity in the Secondary School and Preparatory School numbers had stabilised.

Whilst our 2019 Year 12 results were not quite at the same level as the previous year, they remained well in advance of our average in the years prior to that. In NAPLAN results, comparisons indicated an average improvement across the four year levels involved, over the four years leading up to last year, of 40 places, placing us in the top bracket in schools.

In the co-curricular area, our teams continue to be highly competitive in their various sporting programs. Whilst our Intercollegiate competition with St Peter's College was reasonably evenly shared across the different sports, we were State champions in three sports and were undefeated in three others where a final championship was not determined. Highlights included our Water Polo team's undefeated season, providing our first ever Intercol win in that sport, and our first Intercol triumph in Debating for 17 years. We also saw significant further expansion of our House activities and competition program, which has been extremely well-supported and well-received by students.

In the Performing Arts, our staff have shown great ingenuity and initiative in organising performances under difficult circumstances. We have seen further growth and diversity in our music program, whilst our drama program continues to grow, both in the curricular and co-curricular areas, with some excellent productions.

Whilst our building program was put on hold earlier this year for the time being, in response to COVID, this has enabled us to focus on planning for a number of forthcoming projects, including:

- development of the Bureau of Meteorology site to the east of the Boarding House
- building above the Dining Hall to expand the Library and provide more classrooms
- development of the current car park space adjacent to the back drive
- ongoing development of classrooms and playground areas in the Preparatory School.

At the governance level, the major development for this year has been the advent of our new Chair of Council, Old Scholar and past parent Mr Richard Hockney. I would like to express my own and the College's appreciation to Richard for his leadership this year. As well as his enthusiasm and passion for everything related to Prince Alfred College, Richard brings a unique blend of corporate and business acumen, together with a focus on the culture of the organisation and an overriding strategic focus to this most important of roles.

2020 was to have been the year in which we developed and adopted our new strategic plan, as the current 5-year plan concluded at the end of 2020. We believe that our current strategic plan has served us

well, as we have achieved a number of key objectives, including the following:

- improved academic performance
- record enrolments
- recognition as a leader in boys' education
- major strategic property purchases and development
- endowment growth, especially for scholarship purposes.

However, COVID interfered with the process and timeline we had adopted for developing our new strategic plan, just as it has so many other aspects of our lives. We were unable to undertake the community consultation stage of the process at the scheduled time, causing a delay in the process. Nevertheless, the process has continued and we expect to launch our new strategic plan in the first half of 2021. I thank the members of the College community, including staff, parents and Old Scholars, who have provided input into the process, through survey and focus groups. The College Council has already done a good deal of preparatory work and is determined to produce a plan that will see some bold and significant directions for the College, building on our current strong position.

I would like to mention our departing Deputy Headmaster and Head of Secondary School, Dr John Kinniburgh, whose impact on Prince Alfred College, and particularly the Secondary School, over the last four and a half years should not be under-estimated. Conscientious, principled, decisive, and blessed with wisdom and perspective, John has always kept the needs of the students uppermost in decision-making. A natural leader, it was no surprise when Toowoomba Grammar School identified John as the right person to lead them into the future from 2021.

I wish to make a few observations about our experience of COVID-19 this year and more particularly our response to the various conditions and restrictions that have been imposed to bring the virus under control. I think we have all been very grateful to live in a state that has managed this so well and I think we should acknowledge the quality of the leadership that we have seen in this regard.

Here at Prince Alfred College, I would like to acknowledge the outstanding work of our COVID-19 Response Team, so ably led by John Kinniburgh. As more than one staff member has commented to me, we have had the right man leading our response at this time. As a school with responsibility for the care of a large number of boys and young men, we have assiduously followed all directives and advice from the relevant authorities. We have always erred on the side of caution, but we have also tried to ensure that we have maintained the life and activities of the College as far as possible.

If I may single out one other group of staff for special recognition, it would be our boarding staff, who have kept our Boarding House open since January, to care for our international students, and at certain times domestic boarders, particularly some from interstate. Not only has our boarding house remained open, but the staff, under the leadership of Director of Boarding, Zac Savage, have organised an interesting and comprehensive program of activities to engage the students productively during this period.

As I wrote in the *Princes Record*, on the day that we returned to school after our brief period of remote learning, the sheer delight at being back together again was almost palpable. And then, as the weeks and months went by and we progressively resumed all our regular activities, you could see the appreciation from all involved. I have

never seen such enthusiastic, committed and focused training and rehearsals in the co-curricular space as occurred in second term.

But most importantly, what has been very much in evidence upon our return to regular school is the value of personal and social interactions that schools provide. Whilst we have learnt a good deal about remote learning and the value of doing certain activities online, it is clear that nothing will replace the experience every day of being on site and a part of a vibrant, dynamic and purposeful institution such as ours.

I would like to acknowledge our school leaders and particularly Captain Hugo Jordan and Vice Captains Patrick Eteuati and Henry Gerard for their patience and forbearance under difficult circumstances. I also wish to acknowledge our Captain of International Students, David Yang, winner of this year's Headmaster's Medal for the student who best exemplifies the qualities of the Princes Man, who did a superb job in maintaining the spirits and morale of our international students, particularly boarders, when the prospect of them returning home became progressively more remote, as they endured lockdown and a range of COVID-related restrictions.

Our staff have done a superb job in their various roles in keeping the life and programs of the school operating in the best possible ways during this most challenging of years. It would be fair to say that everything we have done has been more challenging, difficult and time-consuming in the planning and organisation as a result of the restrictions under which we have operated.

Preparatory School Report



A new start in a challenging year

When I was offered the opportunity to join Prince Alfred College as Head of the Preparatory School, I jumped at the chance. I knew the College was an outstanding school as it was one that I had visited on several occasions in my previous capacities. Each time I visited, I was struck by the quality of the grounds and facilities. I met many members of the Preparatory School

team during my visits to learn about best practice, as PAC was always recommended to me as a place where teaching and learning was done very well.

When I arrived here in January, I was made to feel very welcome. I met the exceptional members of the senior leadership team and was quickly made to feel that I was amongst like-minded educators. As I was introduced to the staff of the College, I knew I had made a good choice in moving my family to Adelaide to join this College.

As the term progressed and I got to know the boys and their families, the full extent of the excellent community I had joined became clear to me. I had joined a school community that was driven by high expectations for the boys, one that was supportive, kind and quickly made me feel at home.

The initial start to the year was as I expected, one that allowed me to develop relationships with the staff, boys, and parents. The start was one that allowed me to explore the many facets of the school, from the first-rate teaching and learning that I witnessed as I visited all of the classes, the superb facilities the boys enjoy and the comprehensive range of experiences the boys are offered. It was truly an eye-opening experience that once again reinforced what a good decision I had made to come to PAC.

However, it was not long after I had arrived that it became apparent 2020 was not going to be a straightforward year. As the spectre of COVID raised its head, our close-knit community was now faced with a set of new challenges beyond our control that required us to come together to navigate successfully. While the restrictions that were put in place began to impact what we could do as a school, the strength of our community came to the fore. We had to ask parents to stay away, we had to cancel community events and modify how we engaged with our families. As Term 1 approached a conclusion, the work to prepare for a possible closure of the school became more real. Eventually, a closure was called for and how we teach and learn changed dramatically.

While this chapter of the year was challenging, it did highlight many special features of our school and our community. The way our teaching team rallied to develop our remote learning program, to train the boys, and to do our best to keep them engaged and able to learn at home was amazing. The teachers worked very hard under the leadership of Ms Lisa Clemente to ensure everything was in place for when we had to decide to send the boys home. While we would

have preferred to have the boys at school, the learning that happened remotely was better than we could have expected, and the boys were still able to see one another and engage with their teachers.

Term 2 was a different experience without parents in the school. There were no large gatherings, and no community sports or activities, but again the boys managed, and the parents supported us. Digital assemblies became the norm and allowed us the opportunity to share and speak with the boys about many topics.

As the year moved on, we began a return to regular routines with much of what we did before returning to our program, including assemblies, community sports and music events. We were able to look at planning some significant developments to upgrade our learning spaces. Design work was completed to improve the classrooms and create more functional spaces for the boys to learn in. Approval was given for a new Junior Primary playground to be built by Climbing Tree, the designers of the Morialta Playground. A new space was developed for the Music room, plans completed for a new Art teaching space, and a significant investment was made into creating an open shared space for our Year 6 boys.

As well as plans undertaken to improve the learning environment, the teachers worked to improve our assessment for learning practices and approach. Phase teams worked on our learning intentions for lessons, the criteria we will use to help the boys to assess if they have been successful in their learning, and help staff provide more effective feedback to students. While this work was undertaken to respond to the challenge of the 2020 school year, it will continue in 2021.

A significant action that the staff engaged in this year was the creation of the Preparatory School guiding philosophy document. They worked over the course of Semester 2 to create our Shared Vision - a statement about what we truly aspire to be as a team and a school. This Shared Vision will be used to help us lay out the key areas for development over the next three to five years.

2020 has not gone quite to plan for me but it still has been special. My family has found a new home. My children have embraced their new schools and I have become convinced that PAC is where I want to be for a long time. As we navigated the challenges of this unique year, I have been so impressed with the teachers, boys and parents of this outstanding school. I reflect on 2020 as a year of great success and look to 2021 with excitement as a year that will bring further significant accomplishments that we can all celebrate together.

Secondary School Report



No-one could have predicted 2020 would be the year it was. The start of a new decade, themes of 20/20 vision and after a summer of devastating bushfires, there was a sense that we had a chance to renew again. Of course COVID-19 had other plans and this presented significant challenges on several fronts, in all walks of life, in all homes, cities and countries around the world. In this respect, what the students at Prince Alfred College have achieved this year

is even more special given the circumstances. During challenging times, one's character is tested, and this has certainly been the case for the students in the Secondary School in what has been an extraordinary year.

There has been much to juggle this year with significant expectations placed on our community to adhere to restrictions to prevent the spread of COVID-19. This has always included advice that is aligned with the Government, SA Health and educational peak bodies. Safe physical distancing measures and the personal health and hygiene of all boys and staff have been just two of our priorities during this time.

One section of our community who have been directly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic more than anyone else are our international students. When they returned to Australia at the start of 2021 to re-commence their schooling, several boys were required to immediately enter quarantine. Such has been the nature of COVID that this signalled (regrettably) that these boys would not return home anytime soon and as a result the Boarding House has remained open throughout the holidays and this will continue over the Christmas break. Our boarding staff under the watchful eye of Director of Boarding, Mr Zac Savage, have been outstanding in their provision of continuous care for these boys and their professionalism has been of the highest quality, which I am pleased to acknowledge.

Despite the global pandemic, there has been much to celebrate and acknowledge in terms of student engagement and achievement. Above all, the attitude of both staff and students has shone through and despite the challenges of COVID-19 there has been a vibrancy in the Secondary School and the boys have continued to engage across multiple areas. In particular, I would like to commend the passion and enthusiasm of our dedicated teaching and non-teaching staff whose continuous efforts have focused on providing the best possible experience for the boys. As a result, our boys continue to benefit and enjoy the broad opportunities available to them.

Our pastoral care program continues to grow from strength to strength and fundamental to this is the role of the Tutor. The Tutor is central in the life of a boy in the Secondary School and the Tutors continued this year to provide general academic and social and emotional support to the boys. A key role is to deliver the Princes Man Program, which is a taught wellbeing curriculum based on virtues-based character education.

Our academic program once again provided academic rigour with the Australian Curriculum in Years 7 to 10 providing an excellent foundation for either the SACE or IB at Year 11. On 5 February 2020, there took place the Emeritus Assembly, which is a significant event to present the academic prizes to our 2019 Year 12 leavers. At this outstanding assembly, Yash Giri was named Dux of the College.

Similarly, our co-curricular program shone with outstanding performances in all areas. It was unfortunate that *Generations in Jazz* was not able to take place due to COVID-19 but there were nonetheless numerous opportunities for our musicians to perform to parents and students either on-site or virtually. The Princes Players Theatre Company this year presented the play *One Man Two Guvnors*, which highlighted the talents of the PAC boys and the girls from Seymour, St Peters Girls, St Aloysius and Wilderness who participated. On the sporting front there were numerous successes as well with our First XVIII being named State Champions and our First Hockey team were successful in defending their state title, for the fifth year in a row. Quite an achievement.

Other key events were able to take place including the Year 12 Special Prizes assembly and the Red and White Formal, which was held later in the year but unfortunately only Year 12 boys were permitted to attend due to the COVID-19 restrictions in place at the venue. Held again this year at the Adelaide Convention Centre, with a James Bond theme, it raised \$1255.00 for the chosen charity, Foodbank SA. Our Year 12s were also able to have their Valedictory events including the main dinner at the Adelaide Oval, which provided a fitting send-off to the boys and their parents.

Our student leaders have also shone through and have been instrumental in providing stability and direction to all students. College Captain Hugo Jordan and Vice-Captains Henry Gerard and Patrick Eteuati have been exceptional in leading the Prefect team as well the House and SRC programs. In particular, the House sport and activities program has scaled new heights this year under the guidance of Henry Gerard and staff member Mr Hayden Cleveland.

The College's cross-curricular and outdoor education program figures prominently in the lives of the boys at the College, particularly those in Years 7 to 9. Whilst there were some changes and amendments to the program, we were able to provide the majority of our standard programs to the boys including eduCook, eduKart and Scotts Creek programs. Adelaide week, which was introduced last year, provided Year 8 students with the opportunity to explore the city of Adelaide and its historical, artistic, cultural and environmental legacy. Outdoor education programs continued at Scotts Creek with tight COVID-19 restrictions in place under the supervision of Micha Jensen. Similarly, another successful series of programs occurred at Wambana at the College's Point Turton campus on the Yorke Peninsula. I would like to commend all staff who were involved in running these programs. They have shown great agility and adaptability this year.

Our swimming and athletics carnivals were well attended with excellent participation from the boys. Despite the restrictions imposed and after some re-scheduling, the College was able to complete the majority of Summer and Winter Intercollegiate fixtures against St Peter's College. Our boys acquitted themselves very well and displayed great sportsmanship across all age groups and games. Outstanding sporting and co-curricular achievements were acknowledged at several Honours and Colours assemblies throughout the year.

During Term 3, we commenced the process for selecting the College student leaders for 2021. After a rigorous selection process a new Prefect team was selected with three new College Captains appointed:

- College Captain – Mitch Searle
- College Co-Vice-Captain – Thomas Mallick
- College Co-Vice-Captain – Thomas Searles

The Year 7 to 11 Prize Giving occurred on the last day of Term 4. This significant event provided an opportunity to acknowledge and recognise the achievements of our students this year. It was particularly important this year to finish on a high and to celebrate the success of our boys at the end of a challenging year.

As 2020 closes, this also signals my final report as I depart the College at the end of the year to take up the position of Headmaster at Toowoomba Grammar School in 2021. As such, I would like to take this opportunity to extend my thanks to all within the Prince Alfred College community who have supported me throughout my time at the school. I have always been aware of and admired the tireless work of so many people who provide the students with the opportunities they enjoy. From the ELC, to the Preparatory School, to the Secondary School, there are so many whose sole focus is to produce quality outcomes for you. I extend my sincere thanks to all staff for all that they have done and continue to do for all boys at the College. I would also like to extend my sincere thanks to all parents, guardians and members of the PAC community for their ongoing support throughout my time at the College. I have been grateful for your assistance and wish you the very best for Christmas and the New Year.

I have loved my time at Prince Alfred College, and I feel blessed to have had the opportunity to work at one of Australia's leading independent boys' schools. I would like to extend my personal thanks to the College Executive, who have supported me greatly in my role. Their guidance and advice, their encouragement and assistance, have been greatly appreciated. In particular, I would like to thank the Headmaster for his support over the last four and a half years. It has been a great privilege to have worked for someone who is recognised as one of Australia's most experienced and highly regarded Headmasters.

And I would not be happy at all if I felt that the boys did not throw themselves into their education with enthusiasm and rigour. The outcomes that we regularly celebrate are a clear reflection of this whether they be in the classroom, on the stage or the playing field, in the arts, on excursions and trips, in the other activities in which you all participate. But what brings me the greatest joy is seeing them develop their minds, their social conscience, their willingness to support each other and their character development.

As educators we always think about the impact that a Princes education has on the students. At a personal level, I believe in schools where learning empowers and prepares individuals to deal with complexity, diversity and change. It is also important for a student to learn to be a successful learner, be confident in who they are, to be someone who seeks to make the world a better place.

Whilst 2020 has not been the year that we hoped for, there has been much to celebrate and acknowledge. The diverse opportunities available to the boys, the commitment of our staff and the support of the parent body are outstanding features of our school. This year we have relied upon these elements more than ever. The staff look forward to supporting all boys at the College in the New Year and we wish all families the very best for the Christmas break and the New Year.

Academic Report



The graduating students of 2020 performed strongly in their Year 12 studies. The mean ATAR score was 82.73 and the median was 84.73. The mean score was a one point improvement on 2019. All members of the graduating class count towards the mean and we were therefore pleased with the increase, especially in a disrupted year.

Haoyuan (Ryan) Li and Yurui (Bill) Chen are joint Dukes of School, both

achieving 43 points in the IB for an ATAR of 99.55. They are joint winners of the John Dunn Prize. Ryan achieved six subject merits and Bill five (plus a perfect three points in the IB core). Ryan will now take up a place to study Medical Biosciences at Imperial College London in 2021. Jason Gong was awarded the E.B. Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to Dux of School) with an ATAR of 99.45, with one subject merit. We wish all of 2020s leavers the very best for future endeavours.

There were 52 merits obtained by 35 students in 2020. In the last four years, 228 total merits have been awarded, at an average of 57 merits per year. In 2020, almost a quarter of the cohort (35 boys) achieved at least one merit. This is a recent record and proves that merits are not the preserve of the few.

We were unable to consolidate our recent improvement in NAPLAN due to the cancellation of the tests in 2020. Our Year 3, 5 and 7 results therefore remain the College's best ever. We hope the tests will take place in 2021 for a chance to improve further. From an academic perspective, there is nothing more important to measure than proficiency in English and Mathematics and we believe these tests offer useful information that allows boys to reflect on their learning.

We maintain our commitment to reading for pleasure, and in 2020 over 250 boys completed the Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC), thus matching the total from 2019. We have set an ambitious target of 100% completion in 2021. High levels of achievement require the setting of high expectations, and we believe this is realistic.

A commitment to academic enrichment remains one of our key priorities. The development of minds and expansion of horizons is central to our educative purpose. Balancing expertise and breadth is a great educational challenge and it is necessary to provide appropriate breadth before one can decide upon an area of preferred expertise. During 2020, targeted extension classes ran throughout the Preparatory and Secondary Schools. High culture and intellectually challenging concepts are the right of all, not the privilege of the few, and we believe that anything can be taught to anyone, as long as it is pitched at the correct level. For example, whilst our Year 12 boys were introduced to the works and deeds of Jackson Pollock, Thelonious Monk, Jack Kerouac, Sir Ross Smith, Albrecht Durer, Benjamin Britten and Rupert Brooke, our Year 7 boys were presented with the thoughts, performances, and general output of Kurt Weil, James Joyce, Keith Jarrett, Vik Muniz, John Summerson and the Coen brothers. There is no less of an intellectual focus just because the boys are younger! We assume all boys are clever and curious, and they tend to rise to this expectation.

Around 15 teachers make up the extension team of 2021 and areas for exploration include the diary of Anne Frank as reimagined by *Neutral Milk Hotel*, Beethoven's 250th, the art of the American Dream, the films of Kurosawa, the history of coffee and a colloquium on concrete, with a celebration of the beauty of the brutal.

Due to the global pandemic, opportunities for travel (both international and interstate) were limited, and as a result, some of our marquee academic opportunities were unable to run. This included a teacher delegation to London and a first appearance at the International Forensic Science Competition in Bilbao, Spain. Nevertheless, there are challenges in every academic year and we took things in our stride to focus on opportunities close to home.

In the Preparatory division of the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), nearly half the boys entered (26) were awarded at least a Distinction, with over three quarters of the boys achieving at least a Credit. High Distinctions were awarded to Lucas Pizzino and Aidan Chen (both Year 3), Jaiden Yue and Daniel Foo (both Year 5) and Aleksander Kierno and Deren Yin in Year 6. We have steadily improved our performance in this competition at Preparatory School level, and for purposes of comparison, the percentage of Distinctions achieved has increased three-fold since 2015.

Success in the Hamann School Mathematics Competition (SMC) requires extensive knowledge and strong mathematical problem-solving skills. Owen Chen in Year 7 was placed ninth overall, an outstanding achievement, and Giles Atkinson (Year 10) and Oscar Wang (Year 8) were both awarded High Distinctions.

The Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) focuses on the importance and relevance of mathematics in students' everyday lives, with papers attempted by students from around the world. Eight boys at the College achieved High Distinctions: Jack Zeng, Owen Chen and Connor Heath in Year 7; Olufemi Komolafe, Adam Black and Jiarui Zhang in Year 10; Dinan Perera in Year 11.

The centrepiece of any subject's external competitions is the Olympiad. The Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiad is a year-long competition, requiring extensive knowledge and understanding of mathematics in order to solve complex problems. Medals were awarded to Oliver Smith, Aidan Foo and Owen Chen in Year 7, as well as Ryan Percival and Max Whittle of Year 8. In the AIMO (Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad), four boys were awarded credits: Don Bui (Year 9) and each of Hoon Kang, Giles Atkinson and Jiarui Zhang in Year 10.

The College has a strong tradition of success in the field of science, and there were many commendable performances in 2020. The Australian Science Olympiad represents some of the most challenging exams a student is likely to face at School, with High Distinctions awarded to the top 10% of students who sit these exams internationally. Given the academic standard of those attempting the paper, a High Distinction is a superb achievement. Eleven students at PAC were awarded Distinctions in one or more of the sciences, and 3 boys (Joshua Tamke, Olufemi Komolafe and Luke Stevens) achieved High Distinctions. In addition to this, 13 PAC students in Years 7 to 9 achieved High Distinctions in the Australian Science Innovations Big Science Competition, placing them in the top 10% of all participants.

There were several pleasing achievements in the field of Humanities. The Australian National Geography Competition is the premier competition in this subject for School students. Ruben Japp was placed first in the state for students in Year 10, with Alec Veldhuyzen van Zanten, Josh Tamke and William Newton achieving High Distinctions. In the Year 11 competition, High Distinctions were awarded to Callum Bolwell, Angus Croser, Alexander Henchcliffe and Finn Walsh.

Alexander Titus in Year 12 was a state finalist in the National History Challenge, a competition that has grown in status since its inception over 25 years ago.

Archie McEwen in Year 9 was awarded the Premier's ANZAC Spirit School Prize for 2020. Archie's meticulously researched essay told the story of WWI airman John Godlee, with the prose being both tight and sympathetic. It is highly unusual for a student in Year 9 to achieve this success as the competition is open to older students. It is the first time a PAC student has been awarded this prize. Malcolm McInerney, himself an Old Red (1971), presented Archie with the award and trophy here at the College during Term 3.

The reinvigoration of language learning at PAC continues apace. As the world became closed off to us in 2020 we sought to broaden horizons despite the borders slamming shut.

Eric Luksch was awarded the Schiller prize, achieving second place in the state in SACE Stage 2 German. Eric achieved this whilst still in Year 10. The OzCLO Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO) is part of an international code-breaking competition designed to pit the wits of students against puzzles in language and linguistics. Making our debut in the competition, PAC entered two teams in 2020. Hunter Greenwood and Charlie Gibbon (both Year 9) and Lachlan Bryson (Year 10) received a bronze award. Adam Black, Ruben Japp (both Year 10) and Miles Falahey (Year 8) received a gold award, placing third in the state. This qualified them for the national round, where they were awarded a bronze award.

The standard for 2020's King's Speech Competition was excellent, with winners of the Lionel Logue Awards judged to be Julian Dawson, Nicholas Henchcliffe and Edmund Black for the Preparatory, Middle and Senior School divisions respectively. Nicholas has now been placed first three years in a row and remains the man to beat in 2021. In the UN Youth Public Speaking Competition at the University of Adelaide, George Bartley (Year 10) was one of three participants to be selected as State finalists. He spoke eloquently on how Australia could reduce unemployment and will, hopefully, travel to Melbourne in April for the national finals. Debating and public speaking at the College is in robust health, and our first win in over 15 years in the debating Intercol provided a welcome boost to all involved.

When we look back on 2020 we shall see it as a year where our character strengths were tested more than usual. It has been a year of thinking outside the box, a year of modified programs and change, a year of forbearance and co-operation, a year where we have, more than once, stopped to reflect and think how grateful we are to live in South Australia and to have our families, friends and the College community around us. I would like to acknowledge the extraordinary effort that all boys have put into their schoolwork and their friendships and the patience and co-operation they have demonstrated in the face of change. I would also like to thank the 2020 team of tutors and Year Level Co-ordinators (YLCs) who have worked hard this year to support each boy pastorally and deliver a modified Princes Man Program.

2020 has seen development and expansion of our pastoral profiling tool, AS-tracking. This year we completed three assessments in March, May and September. We have developed a process by which the Dean of Students liaises with STEER and works with YLCs to analyse the tracking data and the YLCs work with tutors to form coaching plans and mentoring strategies for each boy. In this way we can ensure that there is a successful proactive element to the pastoral care of our boys. In 2021 we are looking to pilot an app called U-STEER where our Year 11 boys will learn to track their own socio-emotional wellbeing and I look forward to sharing more with you in due course.

In the Middle School our focus is very much on giving boys every opportunity to explore their talents. This involves trying out things for the first time whether this be a sport, learning to play a new instrument, getting involved in a school production or immersing oneself in a specialised area of learning such as getting to grips with a foreign language or reading a new book. Accordingly, the Year 7s adapted to secondary school well and have undertaken a trip to Scotts Creek, participated in Monday morning quizzes and read a number of interesting books, including *Dark Emu* by Bruce Pascoe. They have explored the virtues of Courage, Integrity, Wisdom and Gratitude and this has assisted them in their character development, importantly to be kind to one another and to be tolerant too.

Our Year 8 boys were fortunate to complete two rotations of Adelaide Week which saw groups get out to visit cultural sites in the city, try out their cooking skills and learn about nutrition through the eduCook program, and to try out their mechanical and design skills in the eduKart experience.

Wambana 2 and 3 were squeezed into Term 3, the program only slightly reduced and modified due to the pandemic while Groups 1 and 4 were unaffected. I extend my thanks and appreciation to Mr Dale Hobbs and his team for making this all possible. I congratulate

the Wambana Men who were Jimmy Murch in Program 1, James Williams in Program 2, Tom Roberts in Program 3 and Jake Hamood in Program 4. These Wambana Men along with all boys gave their very best to the program with each taking home something from the experience. I was fortunate to visit Groups 2 and 4 this year. Group 2 were preparing in Melrose for their solo campout and were learning to build shelters. It was raining that day and a good many of the boys were worried about keeping dry that night. I think many were looking forward to seeing their cosy beds at home, but were also looking forward to the sense of accomplishment that they would feel once the solo was completed. Group 4 were divided into three groups on the day I visited. I went to observe the group that were assigned to do some community work at the Bublacowie Military Museum. We were treated to an interesting day looking around the Museum and the many accomplishments of our South Australian Servicemen. The boys helped to prepare the site for a Remembrance Day Service and this included preparing a plot for the internment of the ashes of an Australian soldier. I was particularly impressed by the boys led by Max Gordon who worked tirelessly to dig the site and set in the headstone.

In the Senior School our pastoral focus is very much on boys specialising so that they can further develop capability and become more confident and expert. It is a time when many boys begin to understand who they are and for them to develop a sense of purpose in all that they do. The Year 10 boys led by Mr Parker studied the cognitive and socio-emotional development of the adolescent brain. Here they learned via keynote lectures and tutorials how their brains are developing and how new neural pathways are developing as they begin to focus in on areas that interest them.

Meanwhile our Year 11 students, led by Mr MacGregor completed a new course on intimate relationships. The boys discussed a number of issues around healthy relationships with interest and maturity. I am sure this was a welcome break from learning about stress management and working on their IB and SACE goals with their tutors.

Our Year 12s faced a tough year with all of the change to the usual rites of passage. The Red and White was postponed with only days to go and at one time looked like it would never go ahead. Thanks to Mrs De Wit, Ms Liddy, Mr Stace and the Red and White Committee it did finally take place, albeit in a modified format, in September. It was a pity to be without the individual photo booths and to sacrifice some of the other grand plans, but I was impressed by the way the boys just accepted things as they were and moved on with clear intent of making the most of what they had. Certainly the harsh lockdown in Victoria was a constant reminder of what schools were going without there. A similar modified format applied to the Valedictory Service at Adelaide Oval which followed later.

At the start of the year Paul Dillon had delivered his annual presentation on safe partying. Of course there had been nothing on being COVID-safe. I believe that during 2020 our boys have had their resilience, patience and problem-solving skills tested, as have staff and parents. I do feel that our community has emerged the stronger for it.

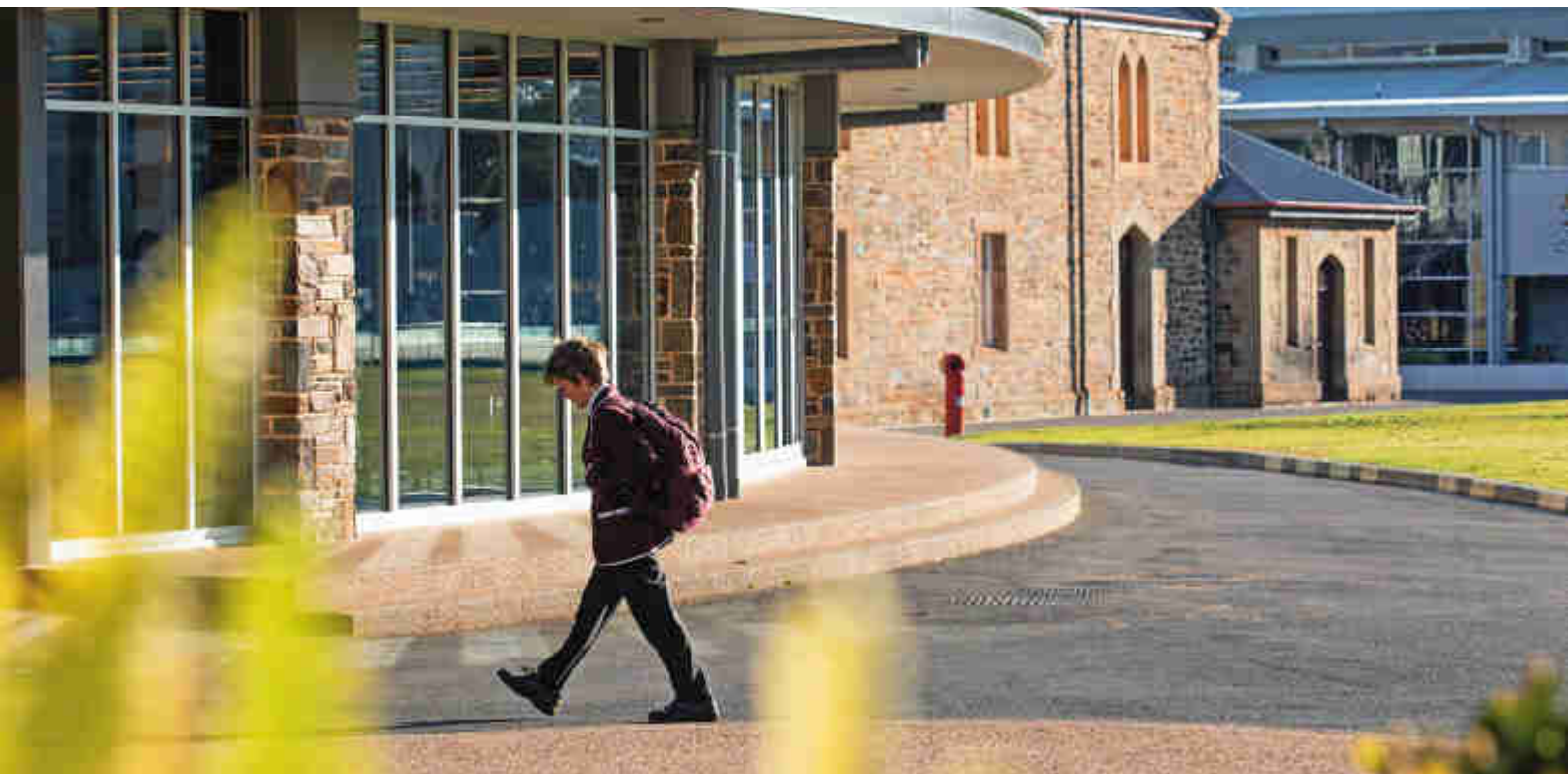

College Chaplain



This year will be remembered by many, well into the future, both for what has happened and for those anticipated activities and events that have not been able to take place. Much of this will be precipitated by the effects of the coronavirus pandemic.

We cannot forget, though, the start of the year which saw significant parts of our state, and also other states, ravaged by bushfires. The fires affected a number of staff and families, past and present, of the Princes community. We noted with sadness the death of Old Scholar Clayton Lang, and his father, caught in the ferocity of the fires on Kangaroo Island. I was grateful for being released from my duties at the College for a short period so that I could contribute in my Army Reserve chaplain role to the bushfire assistance provided on the island by the Australian Defence Force.

The cancelling of large gatherings for much of the first half of the year due to coronavirus restrictions required us to be flexible and adaptable. The Preparatory School was quick to move to a recorded Assembly which incorporated an abbreviated chapel component. These were viewed by the boys in class to end the week. Secondary School Chapel services during this time were also replaced with weekly recorded reflections that were viewed during Tutor group time. Disappointingly, the whole College Easter Service at Wesley Uniting Church had to be cancelled.

I appreciated the opportunity to take some Long Service Leave in Term 3, having now served at the College for over 11 years. Reverend Ian Dow provided chaplaincy support during my absence and I thank him for the presence he provided, ensuring the continuation of the chaplaincy program across the six weeks I was away.

Chapel service themes across the College continue to be drawn from the values and virtues used to define the character of a Princes Man. In the Secondary School these have been grouped under four key virtues, these being Integrity, Wisdom, Courage, and Gratitude. The last named, gratitude, has been the focus of Term 4 chapel. In the Year level chapel services, I shared the correlation between gratitude and well-being. In his book *Man's Search for Meaning*, holocaust survivor Viktor Frankl described the significance 'attitude' played in surviving the horrendous circumstances of the concentration camps. He tells how being grateful for even the smallest of mercies was pivotal to maintaining the will to live.

Numerous studies have concluded that people who maintain an attitude of gratitude report more positively on a scale of well-being. While there might be much we wish to walk away from and forget in 2020, may we take the time to look back on those things for which we are grateful and give thanks.

Angwin Classroom

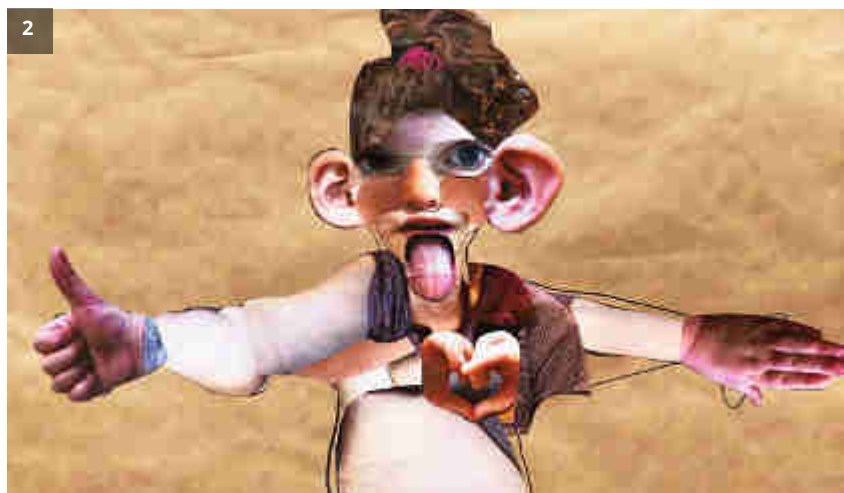

EduCook is always a highlight in the Year 8 calendar and this year was no exception. Whilst EduCook was initially developed with drive from Themis Chrysdis (PAC Old Scholar) and Callum Hann (Masterchef contestant), in recent years the program has constantly been reviewed with the help of a dedicated team of chefs and dieticians at Sprout Cooking School and Health Studio. At the end of the week, the boys and parents gave their feedback, which helps in running this great experience.

Staff and boys travel to work at Sprout each day as part of Adelaide Week. This year, in addition to learning how to work safely in a kitchen, they learnt the importance and benefits of cooking on a budget and taking advantage of seasonal produce. This knowledge was then put to the test as small groups of boys became a business.

First, they had to come up with a business concept, giving a reason for their business. The Business Manager then pitched the idea to the Sprout staff and received feedback on what to change or add to the idea for a successful outcome. Once the idea was agreed upon, they

then progressed to devising a menu which was not only within budget but with recipes that could be adapted from a four person serve to a 60 person serve.

At the start of the week some boys are apprehensive about the idea that after only four days of cooking, they will be cooking for 60 people at their Friday Showcase. The first three days the boys watch demonstrations from the chefs then replicate the dishes in groups of two or three. It is rewarding to watch the tensions disappear as the boys relax and see for themselves that they actually can cook, and wash dishes after themselves. One challenge for many is to test their tastebuds by eating produce they have often never even heard of!

In a week that goes so fast, the Head Chef and Sous Chef are working with recipes and shopping lists while Marketing are busy coming up with designs for logos, uniforms and props to best present their business. This fun-filled week not only educates the boys ready for Wambana in Year 9 but for many years in their futures.

2020 has been a busy year for the Scotts Creek Campus. We began the year with a new look Year 4 program based at the Goolwa Caravan Park. While the weather gave us a taste of almost all the seasons, the Year 4 boys enjoyed their time on the Fleurieu Peninsula with the day at Horseshoe Bay and the evening walk in the sand dunes on the Coorong being a highlight for many.

The Year 5 and 6 programs continued to broaden boys' skills and knowledge of Scotts Creek and the surrounding areas. The Year 5 boys focused on indigenous culture and native resources of the area taking great pride to create their own piece of art and exploring the flood plain and Canoe tree adjacent to the creek. The Year 7 programs gave an opportunity for boys to journey further along the Murray and develop their expedition skills in preparation for the Year 8 program and beyond. The weather this year provided a few surprises, however all the expedition groups managed to venture upstream and explore a new section of the river.

One of the final programs for the year was the Year 3 program at Woodhouse. Challenge Hill presented an opportunity for boys to test themselves on various obstacles and challenges including the Mouse Traps, flying fox and labyrinth. The boys had an opportunity to get up close with some local fauna which was a highlight for many. We also unleashed the boys' creative side with an opportunity to create a design that was transferred onto the outside of a metal drink bottle. There were some inventive designs and certainly the final product is something for the Year 3 boys to be proud of.

The Scotts Creek team have continued to work on the property over the course of the year with the relaunch of Sunboat-I with freshly repaired and painted hulls and a new swimming deck which has been a welcome sight back in the creek. We have also enjoyed the first full year of PV Solar generation and storage on the property. This has provided a talking point with the boys and staff alike as we can monitor in real time what we are generating, storing, importing and using. It's especially interesting when we look at times of peak demand on the property.

While 2020 has provided some challenges, I believe now more than ever before that experiences like the Scotts Creek programs are so important to the overall experience of Princes education. A big thank you to the Scotts Creek staff who have worked hard this year to be able to deliver these experiences under new and ever-evolving conditions.

Looking back through the 2020 Wambana Calendar, we are afforded the opportunity to reflect upon the many achievements and enjoyable times experienced by the students from Year 9 King/Steyn (Term 1), Year 9 Christie/Iadanza (Term 3), Year 9 Bean/Drew (Term 3) and Year 9 Bown/Matthews (Term 4).

Like all other sectors of the Prince Alfred College community, Wambana was not immune to the extraordinary challenges of the global pandemic, COVID-19. The Term 1 program was cut short and our boys had to return to the Kent Town campus a few days early. Consequently, the Term 2 program was postponed and later moved into Term 3. With back to back four-week programs, plus the challenges of adhering to strict COVID-19 procedures, this was a very busy term indeed. The removal of one week from the Living in a Wardli phase, ensured that the integrity of the experience was not jeopardised in any way for our students. Full credit goes to the resilience of the Wambana staff, who worked diligently to ensure the boys experienced the best possible Wambana program.

So how were our four-week programs reorganised? Firstly, each program still contained the essential three phases of Wambana. There was a Sail Away on the *One & All*; a four-day Yorke Peninsula cycle tour of approximately 180 kilometres; wardli living which included cooking, cleaning and maintaining a home; the morning fitness program with the culminating 11km beach run; surfing to catch that perfect wave at Berry Bay; farm visits to Orrie Cowie; studying the habitat of the hooded plover; exploring the dunes on the Adventure Day; chill-out time where those wonderful letters from home could be read; tours of the historic Bublacowie Military Museum; cooking the 'best wood oven pizzas ever'; working with the local communities through such programs as Leisure Options, Point Turton Progress Association and the Gum Flat restoration Project at Minlaton; the Melrose hike, duo campout and last but certainly not least, the solo experience.

A key initiative and focus for 2020 was the introduction and ongoing development of a positive mindset for each student. This was achieved in multiple ways, but a key element was to daily record a

mindset score of 0 to 10 onto a Wambana Mindset Map. Each day, boys would record a measure of their mindset for the morning, afternoon and evening, along with an associated short description of their response. Over time, the on-going mindset line graph that developed was indicative of the fluctuations of life. Boys learnt how mindset influenced those around them and the growth that occurred when they did hard things. In a way, they began to realise that they were far more capable than they ever thought they were. They learned to face and embrace rather than to fear the challenges of the program. A positive mindset is a major key to achieving and sustaining optimal success for each individual. In a way we wanted them to understand that what they believed largely affected what they were able to achieve. A simple change of mindset could help them become the best that they could be.

The facilities at Wambana were upgraded and improved in 2020. A new staff accommodation building, completed mid-year, catered for more comfortable staff quarters and more importantly, allowed for a fifth student Wardli. This was a timely addition, as with fewer students in each Wardli we could comfortably adhere to the South Australian

Health Departments social distancing requirements. Furthermore, included in this development was a purpose-built Medical Centre, complete with two rest and recovery rooms, shower facility and a treatment room. Here again, this new addition has proved to be an asset with the opportunity to better cater for the sick and injured and to be able to isolate students should the need arise.

Each Wardli now boasts its very own veggie garden. Raised student-built garden beds sit proudly in front of each Wardli and allow boys to include fresh vegetable and herb produce in their meal preparation. Our Wambana orchard also continued to flourish this year, with the introduction of new fruit tree varieties such as Quince, Mulberry and Plum.

Finally, despite the difficulties presented to us in these unprecedented times, the Wambana Program has delivered the adventures and challenges essential to bringing out the best in our PAC students.

Community Service

While many of the service and fundraising activities across the year were curtailed due to coronavirus restrictions, the Princes community has continued to provide support and assistance where it could.

Heading into the winter months, the Preparatory School boys were quick to respond to a request from Waltja Aboriginal Corporation for sleeping bags. With the support of the Prefects, the Secondary School also got behind the initiative. Waltja are a community-based organisation in Alice Springs, providing support to the remote communities of Central Australia. Night-time temperatures in that region drop to below zero. With just over \$1000 collected, we were able to purchase 33 sleeping bags. The manager at Anaconda, Mile End, pitched in his support for our endeavours with a generous discount, taking 70% off the retail price.

The Preparatory School boys and families were equally generous with our annual support for UnitingCare Wesley Bowden's Christmas Hamper Appeal. Leading up to the Junior Primary Nativity performance, families were invited to donate food items to assist UCWB's emergency food assistance program. The response resulted in nine full tubs being delivered. Organisations such as UCWB have had a significant increase in demand for emergency support, including food parcels, throughout the year. Heading into Christmas, UCWB, an

agency of the Uniting Church SA delivering individual and community services, were expecting this demand to remain high.

Led by the Prefects, the Secondary School boys directed their major fundraising efforts to Fight MND, a charity which aims to find a cure for Motor Neurone Disease. The sale of Fight MND Big Freeze beanies and lunch-time sausage sizzles resulted in a donation of \$7000 being made to the charity.

Some of the organisations we have regularly supported on an annual basis were unable to hold their usual community awareness activities and events. Restrictions also limited our ability to provide support in other ways too. Needless to say, the community service and cultural awareness trip to Cambodia did not take place this year, disappointing a number of boys.

We look forward to 2021 when we hope that some of these regular service and fundraising activities can resume after a year of limited opportunity.

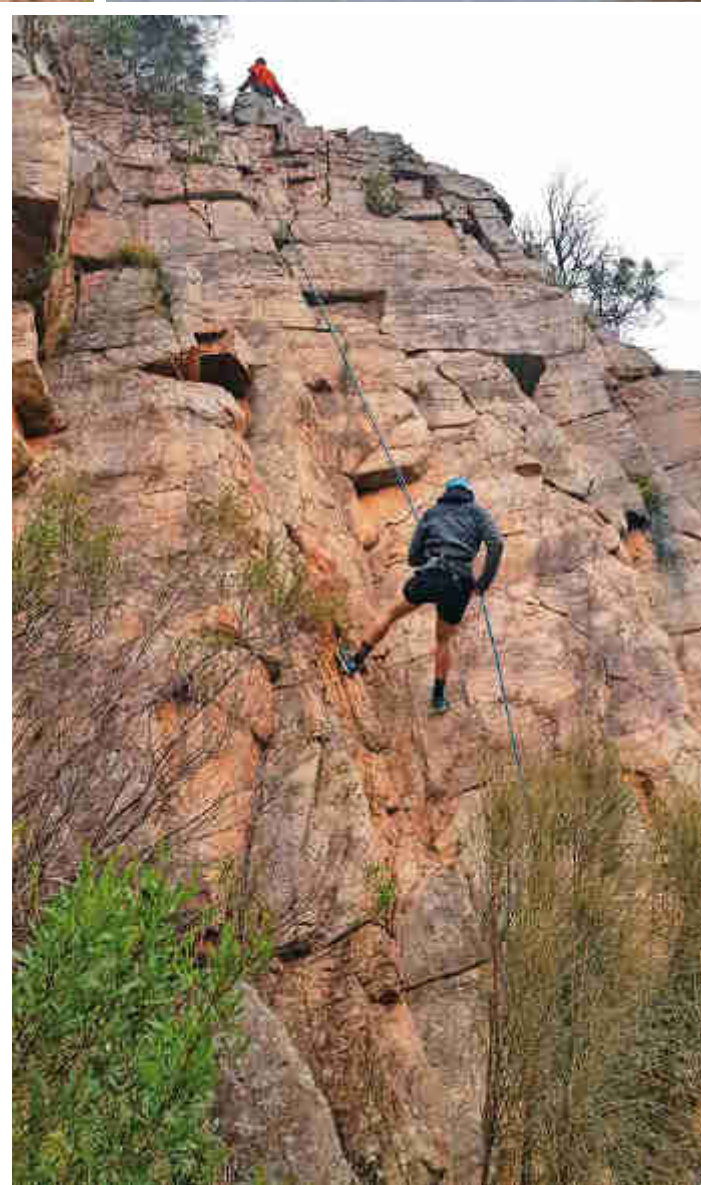
Outdoor Education

And yet, quite a few Old Scholars stay in contact with me and occasionally seek me out for careers advice as well, which gives me valuable insights into what they are exploring.

The career development journey was interrupted this year but I was still able to provide classroom information sessions, speak at assemblies and book one-on-one sessions. It was an interesting experience working from home earlier in 2020, having career guidance sessions via Zoom. Meetings worked better than I had imagined and I appreciated being able to talk to parents and students who were on remote stations so easily. One of my observations was that Zoom/internet video meetings actually worked and in the future, I will be able to reach out to other students who may not be able to attend school for different reasons, including health recovery.

The Careers Team Leaders of 2020 (Brendan Tomlins, Alexander Titus, James Basheer, James Newman, Beau Gemmell, Tom Mitev, Tom Searles, George Atmadja-Sharp, Wilfred Ramsey, Kevin Nugen, Gavin Sim, Joshua Lasscock, Myles McKewin, Harry Henbest) were actively engaged with planning activities and consulting with me throughout the year. As challenges arose due to the COVID-19 outbreak, universities and other tertiary providers planned online careers expos and open days. I offered ANU and Torrens University access to the PAC Career Team Leaders for their opinions prior to program delivery. The team did a test run for each expo and gave the universities feedback which proved an enlightening experience for the students and very helpful for the universities. The organiser for the Torrens University expo (under the Laureate banner) said over 13,000 students attended. The Careers Team Leaders have been a dynamic source of information for me in my planning and program delivery.

Teacher Frank Palladino and I had to think creatively regarding work experience this year and the support needed for the students. Mr Palladino is the VET Co-ordinator at Prince Alfred College and oversees VET qualification courses, as well as apprenticeships. Work experience offers were limited but those who were able to complete a work placement found the time to be very valuable. Year 12 student James Callen was able to work with Wearing and Blairs, a law firm that specialises in employment and workers compensation. James found the week enjoyable, spending time in an actual law firm. Prince Alfred College hopes to revive work experience placements with more offers next year, providing we have the permission to go ahead.

The Careers Office was able to bring in a few keynote speakers for the students: Darin Lovett, PAC Old Scholar and Director of the South Australian Space Industry Centre came in to talk about career pathways available, and emerging. Ms Ashley Schofield's Year 11 IB Physics class were delighted to have Darin take over their Physics class. Nigel Bean, also an Old Scholar and a distinguished Maths academic and researcher from the University of Adelaide spoke about connecting Maths to career paths. Nigel very graciously stayed on to answer questions and inspired all who attended.

As we come to the end of 2020, university and other education-provider applications have been submitted, apprenticeships and employment offers are being sought, scholarship news is beginning to come in, and gap years are being planned. It has been a full and rich year with an exciting world ahead for all of us.

Indigenous Program



This year's journey of Indigenous cultural learning has been significant as the College goes deeper in our understanding of reconciliation and our responsibility to action in a culturally responsive manner.

Interest is building across the campuses. The Early Learning Centre has been active in seeking opportunities to teach the children language and dreaming stories. Singing songs with Kurna words, doing artwork, are all part of embracing cultural learning, starting with the youngest of children at Prince Alfred College. The Preparatory School has also continued to integrate cultural perspectives within their classes. Year 6 teacher, Ms Deb McKay, invited Uncle John Lochowiak (Kurna Elder) to video a Welcome to Country for parents and family members who were unable to attend an assembly. Staff in the Middle and Senior Schools enjoyed participating in cultural responsiveness training with Marlon Motlop, a Larrakia and Torres Strait Islander leader, who was helpful in answering questions and giving guidance.

We value the input shared with us from wise Elders including Uncle Ivan Tiwu Copley, Uncle Moogy Major Sumner, and Uncle John Lochowiak. Uncle Ivan has honoured us with attending our Reconciliation Action Plan meetings and advising us on cultural protocols. He maintains a keen interest in guiding our learning. Uncle Moogy came in to meet with the Aboriginal students for half

a day to share his thoughts on leadership, demonstrating traditional hunting practices (spear throwing and boomerang throwing) and encouraging the rest of Prince Alfred College to keep accessing cultural character stories, including that of the *Little Blue Wren*. Uncle John gave the First XVIII Football Team a Smoking Ceremony here at Princes prior to their big football final with Henley High. The students were empowered by Uncle John's words of encouragement and all were impressed that Uncle John went down to watch the team play... which included the big state win! Uncle John was invited to meet Year 8 students and their teachers at the historical site of the Kurna School on the banks of the Torrens River. There he did a Welcome to Country and talked about the history of Kurna people and their resilience.

We have had eleven Aboriginal students at Prince Alfred College in 2020 and these students, together with their families, have contributed significantly to the education program here. More students and parents are contacting the College expressing their interest than ever before, which is great for growing the Indigenous Student Education Program, under the leadership of Darren Roylett.

In November, an ABC News crew came to the College to film NAIDOC Week activities as well as to cover the Kurna language project that the Preparatory School did together with traditional custodian Jack Buckskin (2019). Jack is a fluent Kurna language speaker

and Prince Alfred College was able to record Jack translating 50 English words into the Kurna language. This was then uploaded to www.50wordsonline by the researchers from the University of Melbourne, to be added to the other Indigenous languages being submitted from around Australia. The ABC team spent two hours on campus and interviewed students and staff which led to an interesting news story showcasing the reconciliation journey of Prince Alfred College. This was aired nationally and the Aboriginal students who were filmed and interviewed did an excellent job representing their families, communities and the College.

Student Success Team

2020 will be a year that people remember for the dramatic change and uncertainty created by COVID-19. Many will also remember the fires and the long lasting effects they caused. Others may remember the loss of a loved one or an illness. Changes to employment and job situation, to financial security and personal circumstances will also be remembered.

Yet in the midst of all of the challenges people were faced with, there was a worldwide surge of kindness, compassion and consideration.

Everyone has a story to tell and to quote a well-used phrase 'we were all in this together'.

Living in Australia and more particularly in South Australia we have become increasingly aware of how fortunate we have been. Empathy for those who have been caught in far worse circumstances have built to a new level and the flow on for our children and adolescents has been palpable.

PAC has, for the most part, been able to continue to function normally. The boys have been buoyed by usual routines, interactions with friends and teachers and their focus has been on something they can control, their learning. This normalcy underpins how well they can cope with life's challenges and research shows that it protects people from developing mental health issues.

Last year, the findings of the Mission Australia Youth Survey¹ provided data on over 25,000 young people across Australia who voiced their hopes and concerns.

The study revealed that it is important for young people to have a voice in issues impacting their lives, both for their own confidence and for more informed policymaking. In addition, mental health, the environment and equity and discrimination were ranked as the three most important issues in Australia in 2019. If we are to listen to young people, we must give more attention to all of these issues.

The top three issues of personal concern for young people from South Australia were:

- Coping with stress, with more than four in ten (42.7%) respondents from SA indicating that they were extremely or very concerned about this issue.
- Mental health was a major personal concern for nearly one third (32.4%) of young people from SA.
- Around three in ten respondents from SA were extremely or very concerned about school or study problems (30.6%) and body image (29.4%).

We can now add COVID to the stresses identified in 2019. As we fast approach 2021, we will have our eyes on the wellbeing of every student.

The learning for each of us from 2020 is that change is a part of life and we must focus on what we can control. The experience emphasises the importance of building resilience in children and adolescents to cope with the twists and turns that life presents.

Student Leadership

Year in review

During 2020, both the number of leadership opportunities and the prevalence of leadership in the student body grew substantially. 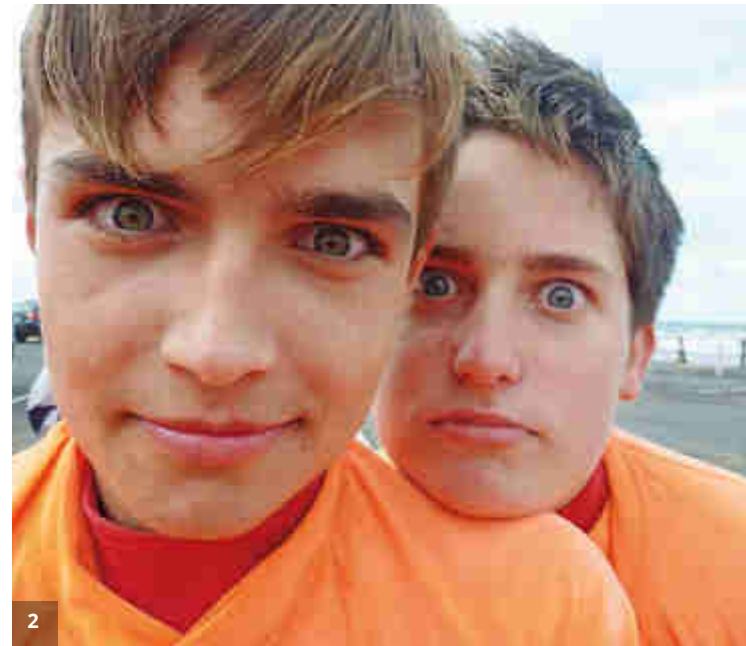

International Students



2020 has proven to be a year of challenges and highlights for our international students. Due to travel restrictions, they have been unable to see their families and friends for almost a year. While the College was able to keep the Boarding House open in school holiday breaks (including the upcoming Christmas holidays), the boys have deeply missed their families and friends back home. However, despite the stress and sadness this has caused, our international boys have managed to show incredible courage and resilience. We have been so proud of them for continuing to be patient, hardworking, kind and grateful.

At the International Student Valedictory Dinner, Carlos Chung, 2020 Vice Captain, said that the international students in boarding were particularly grateful to Mr Oomens for his continued support and advice, and to Ms Thompson in the Health Centre for ensuring the health of all students in the school community. David Yang, 2020 International Student Captain echoed Carlos's thoughts, adding that Mr Savage, Head of Boarding, had expertly guided the boys and boarding staff through a very challenging year – and in his first year in the role! David also reflected on his four years at the College, saying that no matter how far he goes, like his fellow internationals, he leaves the College very much a Princes Man. The 2021 International Student Vice Captain, Hayden Wong, represented his fellow internationals in his speech for Languages Week in Term 4 at the College. He said that PAC had kept its heart open, despite the closure of the borders by enabling the international boys to stay in the boarding house during school holiday breaks and providing a range of unique activities to keep them busy.

David Yang's efforts and enthusiasm, in his role as International Student Captain, were truly commendable. He demonstrated excellent leadership, impressive intercultural awareness, honesty, humility, patience and respect in all of his interactions – so it was not a complete surprise to hear his name called when the winner of the Headmaster's Medal was announced at the Valedictory Dinner!

Another highlight for our boys was when Rico Cheung won the Monash University Prize for English as an Additional Language (EAL). Over his time at the College, Rico has proved to be a very talented language learner, continually refining his skills at every opportunity.

A core part of our international program is the International Student Transitional Program (ISTP) which aims to build students' confidence in using English and develop their awareness of the expectations of an Australian school. Boys study English for Academic Purposes (EAP), Physical Education, Science and Mathematics, and are exposed to the learning of the content of these subjects alongside the language. On completion of the course, they are equipped with the skills needed to participate in their mainstream subjects. Our students report feelings of real achievement when they can cope with and write and talk about complex material in English. Our yearly city tour enabled the boys to explore some of the highlights of the city including the Art Gallery, Museum and Riverbank precinct.

Our international boys undertake a broad curriculum at Prince Alfred College. They are involved in the life of the entire school. Boys are placed in Tutor groups and House teams. They attend assemblies and are strongly encouraged to take part in co-curricular activities including sports, music and art. Our international boys have made us very proud through their participation and achievement in a range of College activities including squash, badminton, basketball, table tennis, debating and musical bands. Some of our boys even performed the Lion Dance at the Preparatory School during Chinese New Year and Valedictory dinner. We have been impressed by our prefects and leaders, who have successfully organised several events and activities.

As in other years, the international cohort has engaged with the school community through a variety of interclass and school activities which have helped develop camaraderie across peer groups and year levels. In Term 3, the Year 9 EAL students presented



their very inspiring and entertaining motivational speeches to the Year 11 Language B English class. The older boys were impressed by the confidence and the delivery of their younger peers. There have been 'language exchange' activities, with Mr Zheng's Year 10 Chinese class working with the Year 11 English boys, sharing ideas and language learning tips as they discussed various topics in both Chinese and English. A number of guest speakers from around the College spoke to the International Student Transition Program (ISTP) class, providing much needed insight into the life of Australian schools. Guests included Ms Cadiz and Ms Capil, who spoke about the library and the Premier's Reading Challenge, which our boys took part in. The Year 9 EAL class were lucky to have Mr Scrymgeour, former Director of Advancement, give them an insight into marketing to support their development of media literacy. Many of our international boys enjoyed school performances including the well-received *One Man, Two Guvnors* play. In the Year 11 class, we were very fortunate to have Uncle John, an Indigenous elder, talk to the boys about spirituality, connection with the land and relationships between people. The pandemic limited our social events, but we managed to hold a Halloween celebration with the international girls from Wilderness. These kinds of interactions build stronger bonds within and beyond the College community.

This year, 12 international students have completed SACE or IB courses, with most of them spending almost four years in the College. This group of resilient, intelligent, ambitious and hardworking young men have enriched our College. We are confident that they will uphold the values and morals of a Princes Man in the years to come.

Performing Arts

Year in Review

On the back of unprecedented success across the Performing Arts Department in 2019 – Division 1 Big Band Champions at Generations in Jazz, concert band clean sweep at ABODA, a dynamic and professional musical in *Bugsy Malone* and record numbers of boys involved in Film – 2020 always had big boots to fill. While we won't look back and see coveted trophies with 2020 on them or photos of boys on tour around the world, staff and students in the Performing Arts will look back with pride on a year where their commitment, resolve and versatility was put to the test. It was a year where they developed new skills, learnt to appreciate things that we'd previously taken for granted, and realised the truly unique role that the arts play in our lives. Character building aside, thanks to the support of College leadership and favourable conditions in South Australia, there was no shortage of exceptional performances on the ANZAC Hall stage this year. Whether viewed live or online, I hope you all felt the way our staff did in those special moments – entertained, proud, and grateful for all that the performing arts offers our boys and the world at large.

The Music Department started the year by celebrating the outstanding results of the 2019 Year 12 musicians – 86% of SACE Solo and Ensemble students achieved in the A band, along with two 7s and two 6s in the IB Music class. For students looking to become the best musician possible, there is no substitute for the academic study of Music through the SACE and IB pathways. With a memorable cohort of music leaders now out the door, it was time for others to step up, and led by 2020 Captain of Music Edmund Black, these young men did just that. It was clear in Term 1 that the extra performance opportunities afforded by the Sesquicentenary year, and the success at Generations in Jazz, had left music students hungry for more. With a record five rock bands, a new wind offering in the Saxophone Ensemble and the new Princes Seymour Voices, more and more boys were enjoying weekly music offerings. Ready to support and enhance this progress in 2020 were two new faculty members – Music Teacher Ms Jessica Reppucci and Voice Co-ordinator Ms Fran Greenwood. The Music Department was firing on all cylinders with a range of performances about to occur when things came to a screeching halt in March.

The news of Generations in Jazz being cancelled hit the College Music community hard. 'At least we'll be reigning champions for a record time' many of us remarked to try to cheer up the boys and ourselves. If you haven't experienced it, it's hard to explain the uniqueness of that event. Fortunately, Year 7-10 Music classes had just enjoyed a couple of excellent excursions to the Adelaide Fringe, furthering the boys' understanding and appreciation of the professional arts industry and inspiring their own performance ambitions. As a faculty of creative minds and adaptable individuals, it was time for us to get to work and turn the COVID challenge into new positive experiences for the boys at Prince Alfred College. With the use of Zoom and Teams, and later the refurbished ANZAC Hall and our marvelous Tech Crew and staff, as the Director of Music I am exceptionally proud of what our department produced in that period. The various co-ordinators go into more detail in their articles to follow, but the range of experiences on offer in Term 2 kept students engaged, motivated and connected with each other and their community at a time when these things were lacking for many. After a farewell tour that rivaled John Farnham thanks to the challenges of relocating to the UK, we finally said farewell to Ms Lizzie Gregory halfway through Term 2. Ms Gregory will go down in the history books at the College for her directorship of Big Band 1 in 2019, but for the boys and staff who were fortunate to work with her, they'll miss a passionate, talented and fun-loving music educator.

The Drama Faculty welcomed Ms Natalie Goodair to the fold in 2020. Covering for Ms Paula Little this year, Ms Goodair brought a wealth of performance experience from the stage and screen, which the girls and boys on this year's major production certainly appreciated as she joined our production team. Although relatively new to the College herself, Drama Teacher Ms Rebecca Hassam took the bull by the horns when it came to directing the 2020 whole school play, *One Man, Two Guvnors*. With exceptional organisation, energy and commitment, Ms Hassam guided students and the creative team of staff through a wonderful journey with this comedy play, culminating in four high quality performances in the ANZAC Hall in late July. A period of online rehearsals could not deter this group, with the outcome being a genuinely entertaining two-hour experience which will be fondly remembered by all those involved.

It is fair to say that Film is an exciting space at the College right now. Record numbers are in the academic courses on offer from Years 10 to 12, the Princes Film Festival is gaining an increasing profile, and above all there is a tangible bond and culture amongst the Film students and staff. The culture is evident in many ways – its intense concentration on boys' faces as they work at an editing suite, the looks and laughter that are exchanged when viewing a film, and that unstoppable conversation about their ideas and craft that is part of everyday life at the College for these students. The growing positive culture is a credit to the character and expertise of our Film Teacher Mr Mike Oomens, along with Mr Dan Woolford, and this year supported also by Mr Mike Steer. Many of the students are also musicians, actors and/or members of Tech Crew, so it's a feather in the cap of our Performing Arts Department the way these disciplines are moulding together to improve student outcomes and experiences.

In the face of challenges, aided by some good luck with timing and many committed individuals, 2020 has been a resounding success for the Performing Arts. There was no greater moment of advocacy for our department this year than hearing the outgoing Year 12 Music leaders talk with passion about their time at the College. While missed events are of course disappointing, the focus on the journey, the camaraderie, the small moments, the valued mentoring, legacy and culture, all provided inspiration for our boys and strengthened the resolve of our staff. I would like to thank all peripatetic musicians for their work this year, in particular new members of the team Mary-Anne Roberts (oboe), Gareth Davis (trombone) and Jade Blanchard-Paterson (strings). We're blessed to work in a small but effective team in the Performing Arts, so thank you to all Music, Drama and Film staff once again, along with the fine Facilities, Calendar and Advancement teams who so ably support all our endeavours. Lastly, to every Performing Arts student and family member – thank you for your ongoing efforts and support. There is so much to be excited about in this space and we look forward to taking even larger strides forward in 2021.

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Drama – Curricular

Drama curriculum in middle years aims to widen students' understanding of styles in drama and their impact on performance historically. In Year 7, students learn about the foundations of performance in Greek Theatre and the purpose of the Greek Chorus. Students learn about the initial forms of tragedy and comedy, and are exposed to classical texts including Aristophanes' *The Frogs*. In Year 7, the Drama cohort applied Greek chorus work skills to a modern context such as the impact of the bushfires on the community and wild-life and performed their chorus pieces at the Middle School Drama Showcase in Term 4. In Year 8, students deepen their understanding of comical forms in their study of commedia dell'arte where they begin to work with expressive exaggerated forms of character and mask acting work. This year the Year 8 Drama class worked with artist in residence Andrew Crupi on the psychology and physicality of each stock commedia character to expand their understanding of this traditional form. Year 8 Drama students worked on self-devised improvised masked commedia scenarios which were performed during the evening Showcase. In Year 9 Drama, students applied heightened realism techniques to a Shakespeare text and performed scenes from *Romeo and Juliet* using stage combat skills. Students worked with industry stunt professionals Ruth Fallon and Nino Pilla on stage combat and sword fighting skills and devised choreographed routines with the Shakespeare text which were performed in traditional costume for parents in Term 4. The middle school Drama students also participated in viewing professional performances from the Adelaide Fringe and Adelaide Festival including *Orpheus* from the UK by The Flanagan Collective and Gobbledigook Theatre, and *The Artist* from Finland by Circo Aereo, designed to inspire and further influence their learning of Drama in the industry.

In senior years, Drama students specialise in production practices and learn to simulate the workings of a theatre company. This year the Year 10 Drama class staged the production *Twelve Angry Men* by Reginald Rose in the Prince Philip Theatre. *Twelve Angry Men* was set on a rainy humid summer day in 1957 in a stuffy jury room of a New York City courthouse. The accused was a young man from the slums on trial for the murder of his father with a switchblade. Twelve male jurors reached a unanimous decision as to whether the young man was guilty or not guilty of murder in the first degree. During Term 3, the class worked from a detailed rehearsal schedule on the production processes of understanding the script through to formulating a detailed backstory for their characters. Throughout the process, they worked alongside industry professionals Ruth Fallon and Nino Pilla who choreographed the tense stage combat moments in the script as well as the College Tech Crew in the production week of the process, finalising sound and lighting cues. The students were costumed as middle-aged men from the mid 1950s and were appropriately aged through greyed hair and old age make-up techniques. The audience were placed within the boxing ring on the traverse stage setting. Eye-balling the other side of the audience, they equally assumed the position of jurors as they deliberated the evidence during the slow rising climax. However, being positioned only on one side meant the audience deliberately witnessed only one side of the story. As hostility built amongst the men, the room became more and more claustrophobic, was an effect amplified by the warm lighting and tense non-diegetic sound effects.

The Stage 1 Drama class demonstrated their understanding of Absurdism style in their public performance of *The Prodigal Son* by Jack Hibberd. Absurdism demonstrates human beings struggling to cope with their lives in a hostile world. The language was non-sensical, illogical, clichéd, repetitive, and silence was used effectively. The characters were exaggerated and over the top which gave them a comical appearance and the movement was often non-realistic, stylised or mechanical. *The Prodigal Son* focused on the complicated family dynamics between a mother, father and their son. Tension was obvious from the onset that the mother ruled in this household. Both father and son were fearful; however, they made attempts to assert themselves along the way. The play outlined the painful existence of each character.

The mother disclosed her dissatisfaction with motherhood, her inability to nurture her child and her disapproval of her son's failed career. The father actively disengaged from life and found solitude in idolising his son, his obsession with golf and becoming lost in his past thoughts. The son came home to face his demons. He disclosed what had prompted his emotional breakdown and ended his career as a pianist being met with hurtful rejection. The mature performance from the Stage 1 class in this production is evidence of the knowledge and skills that are being developed by our students across the Drama curriculum.

One Man, Two Guvnors

The 2020 whole school production, *One Man, Two Guvnors* by Richard Bean, was a raving success! The Prince Alfred College students did this rollicking farce justice and intrinsically understood the complex comedy of the play, bringing to the surface the success of this artform. Based on Carlo Goldoni's commedia dell'arte classic, *The Servant of Two Masters*, playwright Richard Bean cleverly remastered *One Man, Two Guvnors* and relocated the setting to the British seaside town of Brighton in 1963. *One Man, Two Guvnors* traced a convoluted storyline of the criminal underworld in a cat and mouse chase for money and love. In amongst the miscommunication and deception was Francis Henshall, who held down two jobs and spent the duration of the play keeping one guvnor away from the other to maximise his chances of collecting double the pay. Watching the senior students expertly explore their comic physical slapstick timing and use of witty language, and play their nuanced characters purposefully, made it a pleasure to direct and experience. In the lead roles, Angus Porter (Year 10), James Walters (Year 10), Matthew Adams (Year 10), Bailey Lock (Year 11) and Brendan Tomlins (Year 12), confidently took charge of the stage and fully developed their stock characterisations and teased out the comic interplay in the moment-to-moment action on stage. Sections of the play were structured using pure improvisation which meant that every show was different and was injected with its own fresh energy and unique charm. This style alone is a challenge for any performer and only propelled the actors to invest further in the process because they were given the trust and responsibility to drive the comedy action as the performance evolved.

The success of the production was achieved by the onstage and off-stage students working cohesively throughout the process. Working under the uncertainty of COVID was difficult, yet the ensemble cast, band and crew of 50 students and tutors managed to keep their spirits up and experience what positive teamwork was all about. During the production week, the actors, band and tech crew worked through technical and production issues with a level-headed and methodical approach and tackled each rehearsal with enthusiasm and excitement. The energy was lifted further with the onset of the Beatles Band whose tight performances and impeccable timing tied the scenes together and furthered the unstoppable energy throughout the show.

The experience of *One Man, Two Guvnors* has had a positive and lasting impact on the confidence and working relationships of students who were involved. Performing *One Man, Two Guvnors* could not have come at a better time for the College community who all really needed to experience a good belly laugh and appreciate and value shows that are designed for pure entertainment.

Tech Crew and Theatresports

The purpose of drama co-curricular is to find opportunities for students to work on projects together, bringing forth confidence in their learning, leadership skills, mentorship and cohesive work practices that mirror the professional industry. The Tech Crew this year have excelled in their skillset to take on the technical support for what ended up being an eventful year for the Performing Arts. From the live streaming during the PAC LIVE concerts to *One Man, Two Guvnors*, curriculum senior school performances and the Top of the Pops music concert, these students have furthered their skills in sound, lighting, vision and stage management operations. The group is led by industry professional Logan Conway who teaches the dedicated group technical skills to support them on events. This year, the Tech Crew furthered their lighting knowledge and worked with industry professional Jay Rayner over four intensive sessions. Students explored how to program, design lights and problem-solve issues with the Grand MA equipment which formed the basis of their design for *One Man, Two Guvnors*. The group works on a mentorship basis where students who have developed their knowledge support students who are learning new skills. The technical roles are rotated from one project to the next with the aim that all students learn all technical roles. This year the Tech Crew are responsible for running the school assemblies with the aim to support the technical operations in the school.

Theatresports is an essential part of growing as a performer as it encourages students to build their confidence and ensemble skills in performance and explore creative and inventive ways to problem-solve scenarios. This year a dedicated group of students from Year 7 through to Year 12 worked on Theatresports techniques every Thursday lunchtime with Mrs Natalie Goodair, learning the skills of yielding and making offers in performance. Theatresports ended with a competition between five groups of improvisers that were judged by a panel for their techniques exhibited, plot structure, character development and ensemble skills. It was a good way to build confidence and working relationships in a creative setting.

Strings

2020 has been as busy, successful and rewarding as previous years despite the obvious challenges we faced together with the rest of the world. For the Strings Department the year kicked off with the second Music Retreat the day before the start of Term 1. Although planned concerts could not go ahead by the end of the term, the boys quickly and effectively moved to online sessions which presented obvious difficulties for ensemble work. The students were nevertheless absolutely brilliant in taking personal responsibility for their progress and continued to develop during the weeks of meeting on Teams. Sheet music, tutorials, recordings and more were shared on this platform to ensure constant communication and musical growth and in return the boys uploaded recordings and videos of themselves for assessment.

At the start of Term 2 all musicians were hungry to get together and make live music again – a genuine sense of appreciation for these opportunities had developed amongst the boys, and their recorded concert Midweek Serenade during PAC LIVE in Week 4 was very well received by performers and online audiences alike. Although the buzz of a live audience is always more gratifying this PAC LIVE concept opened up so many new opportunities to share and showcase the many talents of the boys at the College.

At the start of Term 3 we were very happy to be able to have the usual intake of Year 2 students for the Strings Immersion—their progress was sealed by being afforded a performance opportunity in an assembly towards the end of term. During Week 4 of Term 3 all musicians enjoyed having a live audience again for Live Music Week, which was also recorded and made available later via a YouTube link for those who were not able to attend the concert in person. Just a few weeks later the Top of the Pops concert was an absolute highlight and also a festive way to farewell the outgoing Year 12 musicians.

Term 4 started with the Performing Arts Awards Night where boys could be recognised for their effort and hard work. Of particular note were the speeches given by the Music Captains which showed enormous growth, appreciation, maturity and humility. The Chamber Strings were very happy to honour Edmund Black as an excellent musician and all-round quality person in performing his composition, *Chroma Key*, at the Week 1 assembly. On a warm and humid Tuesday 10 November, Voices and Strings joined forces to present their showcase in the Chapel, also including selected soloists from all instrument groups. At the time of writing this report COVID has stuck out its ugly head again in our state and we know that some planned events for the rest of Term 4 are at risk of not going ahead as planned. We have however established through the complexity of 2020 that we value each opportunity, take nothing for granted and appreciate our colleagues just that little bit more. We have also grown a better understanding and empathy for the personal trials of so many others and realised that music as an art form has incredible power to unite and uplift.

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Voice

2020 has been a year of evolution and development for voice at Prince Alfred College. In my first year as Voice Co-ordinator at the College, my introduction to the boys kicked off at the annual Music Retreat in late January. Band players, string players and vocalists took part in a combined workshop, which served to emphasise the value of singing for all musical development and begin to cultivate an appreciation and fondness for community singing within the College. I was met with engaged, willing, jovial boys, and was heartened to see the camaraderie and supportive nature amongst them.

The beginning of Term 1 saw the recruitment of new members and allowed the boys and I to discuss our vision for the future of singing at the College and what each ensemble might look like. Apart from the continuation of the Senior Vocal Ensemble, Princes Voices, Junior Voices and Motown Vocal Ensemble (under the direction of Mr Ross Burford), we also saw the development of a new ensemble, Princes Seymour Voices. This is a mixed choir co-directed by Director of Performance and Co-ordinator of Choirs at Seymour College, Mrs Stephanie Eaton.

The commencement of Term 2 saw all vocal ensembles (with the exception of Princes Seymour Voices) debut their first performances for the year in their new configuration. A recorded and streamed performance concept, PAC LIVE saw Senior Vocal Ensemble perform a four-part rendition of 'Sh-boom', by the Crew Cuts, while the Princes Voices sang a modern-day popular music favourite, 'Demons', by Imagine Dragons. Under challenging circumstances, the boys rose to the occasion with a highly successful evening of music by multiple ensembles and soloists.

With the success of PAC LIVE Term 3 kicked off with Live Music Week, another recorded event, this time with a number of shorter concerts throughout the week. With a gradual rise in numbers, the now 36 members of Junior Voices performed two high energy songs, 'Choir' by Guy Sebastian and 'Believer' by Imagine Dragons. Princes Seymour Voices had their debut performance singing 'River of Dreams' by Billy Joel, and the Motown Vocal Ensemble sang a vocally challenging medley, 'Motown: The Musical', arranged by Mac Huff. Term 3 continued to deliver with an electric night of music, the themed Top of the Pops concert. Ensembles from every music department shared the stage in a fantastic demonstration of creativity, talent and collaboration. Classic hits were performed, such as a 'Bon Jovi Tribute' by Princes Voices. The next night Princes Seymour Voices performed at Seymour's annual Gala event and joined in their mass choir presentation of 'The Voice', a commissioned orchestration by Mr Grant Eaton. Term 3 drew to a close with Senior Vocal Ensemble performing their first gig at the Capri Theatre alongside Big Band 1, with the swing classic, 'Mack the Knife' by Bobby Darin, featuring a sensitive solo by Allan Hsi.

In Term 4 our performance year was brought to a close at the final concert, the Strings and Voice Showcase. During an intimate evening in the College's beautiful chapel, students from Years 2-11 performed, featuring a combined string and vocal rendition of Coldplay's 'Viva la Vida'. Reflecting on the year, I have been delighted by the evolution and continued development of the vocal program. Under difficult circumstances, Princes Seymour Voices has achieved a successful first year, quickly becoming the most popular ensemble at both Colleges. Membership of Princes Voices has more than doubled, and I am overwhelmed to confirm Junior Voices has risen from 7 to 50 members. Seeing this clear enthusiasm for singing, I am eager to explore and expand more vocal opportunities in 2021 and I look forward to the continuing development of voice at the College.

Bands

2020 has been a year that has presented obvious challenges, but it's also been a year of many successes with the College concert bands and big bands performing at high levels in varying scenarios. Even though some of our mainstay events such as Generations in Jazz and The Essentially Ellington Jazz Festival were cancelled, we found alternative ways to challenge the boys throughout the year. As Term 1 came to a close, we found ourselves in uncharted territory with staff and students having to learn online platforms, Microsoft Teams and Zoom, so that we could continue delivering our program to the boys. It was important that we kept consistency with our Band Program moving forward as we had to forgo the opportunity for the bands to perform at our normal end of Term 1 and lead up to Generations in Jazz concerts. Thankfully, the majority of the boys were willing and able to ensure a seamless transition to online learning including the younger bands such as the Beginner and Junior Concert Bands.

It was important that we kept the boys motivated during these unprecedented times. Thanks to our creative Music staff led by Andrew Edge, we came up with the idea of doing a concert online during Term 2, giving us a new goal. By Week 2 of Term 2 we were able to resume rehearsals with social distancing in place. While the spacing is far from ideal musically, the boys were willing to do whatever it took to continue to work towards a performance. The Bands played to great acclaim at PAC LIVE even with the technical challenges. I was particularly impressed with the Beginner Concert Band as this was their first performance. Even though this event was not to a live audience, the performance was very similar to a studio recording with six cameras operating around the ANZAC Hall, creating a very real sense of occasion for the boys. We were then very fortunate to be able to bring another online performance where selected bands had the opportunity to perform towards the end of Term 2. The second time round brought a more seamless transition to the streamed event with fewer technical problems and some fine performances, with students also watching the concert from the comfort of home.

With no Essentially Ellington or ABODA events in the first half of Term 3, it was vitally important that we continued to set performance goals for the bands. We were fortunate enough at this time to be able to invite parents back to watch live. This was very significant for our youngest band, the Beginner Concert Band, as they had not performed to a live audience at all. By this time, they would have normally given two or three live performances. As you can imagine, they, along with all the bands, were very excited at the prospect of having people in the audience watching. However, the Live Music Week concerts were still recorded for those who chose to stay at home. The bands rose to the occasion and it was a significant moment to resume that connection with a live crowd. The promise of a large

crowd and a return to normal spacing on stage went a long way to motivating the boys toward the final Top of The Pops concert for Term 3.

Although the boys were disappointed that our special guest, Rai Thistlethwayte, could not get clearance to enter the state to workshop and perform with us, they knew that the occasion was bigger than just one person. So they stepped up their work and were excited by the opportunity to perform with our very own music staff at the Top of the Pops concert. The boys exceeded expectations; all the bands played with distinction. I was particularly impressed with the maturity shown in all big bands as they stepped it up to another level showing the capacity live audience that even with a world pandemic we can continue to perform at the highest level. With limited rehearsal the combined concert band was a show-stopper with their rendition of *Final Countdown*, where the band was spread around the ANZAC Hall to create a stereophonic effect.

We were fortunate enough that one of our annual community gigs at the Capri Theatre was still able to go ahead as restrictions eased. Therefore, it was unanimous that Big Band 1 play at this event as we wanted the Year 12 boys to get as much opportunity as they could before their final farewell. The boys did not disappoint, showing that their win at Generations in Jazz the year before had been no fluke. As always, the staff and audience at The Capri Theatre were thrilled with the performance and look forward to seeing us again in 2021.

As we farewell the talented Year 12s, we have been blessed with a strong new showing in the Big Band Program, evidenced by record numbers at auditions at the very end of Term 3. All of the 2021 big bands got their chance to give one final performance at the Live@Langley Concert in Week 5 of Term 4. This proved to be a strong performance with all bands giving a glimpse into the depth of musicianship, culture and excellence that the Band Program continues to uphold.

Film

We were pleased to see continued growth in Film in 2020. The year began with our strongest numbers ever, with six boys in Year 12, 14 boys in Year 11 and 22 boys in Year 10, making a total of 42 students across all courses. With the larger numbers in Year 10 another class was added, and we were joined by Mr Mike Steer in the film lab. The continued growth in the course was supported by new equipment to add to our existing stock, in particular Ledgo LED lighting kits and RODE compact wireless mic kits which enhanced our technical capacity.

The Year 12 boys were able to complete all their assessments this year, despite the early impact of Coronavirus lockdowns. Indeed, the pandemic provided the inspiration for one of our final productions,

which explored one man's response to living in isolation. Our other Year 12 film this year examined the difficulties parents and their sons have in balancing their time together amidst their busy lives. The boys also explored some interesting topics in their final theory submissions, including the influence of Wong Kar-Wai on the films of Sofia Coppola, the representation of race in American cinema, and the use of the Samurai code in Jean-Pierre Melville's *Le Samourai* and Jim Jarmusch's *Ghost Dog*.

Our Year 11 students began their two-year journey to their final submissions with great enthusiasm. This year they have explored the application of film techniques in Spielberg's *Saving Private Ryan* and the narrative structure of *Run Lola Run*. Other classic films studied in class included Fritz Lang's *M*, John Ford's *The Grapes of Wrath*, Billy Wilder's *Double Indemnity*, Ridley Scott's *Bladerunner* and, of course, Orson Welles' *Citizen Kane*. The boys' filmmaking showed strong evidence of their own development in technique, with a particular feature of their work being their willingness to get out on location and shoot films in their own time. This adds a great deal to the final result.

The Year 10 boys were introduced to the magic of cinema through *Star Wars*—a film that many are familiar with, but some have not yet seen. While developing their practical skills with some simple film exercises, the boys also studied the history of Australian cinema. This included units of work on Rob Sitch's *The Castle*, Peter Weir's *Gallipoli*, and Phillip Noyce's *Rabbit Proof Fence*, as boys investigated the ways in which we view and represent ourselves.

In October, we were happy to present our second annual Princes Film Festival. The event was well attended and provided a showcase for our filmmakers in Years 9 to 10, as well as a fun competition for boys across the College. It is notable that the Film Festival is one of the few events on the calendar that brings the work of boys from both campuses together. This year's Festival was judged by Mr Jonathan Scobie and Mr Nick Iadanza from the English Department. They were joined by our guest judge, Mrs Jayne Kelly, Chair of the Association of Teachers of Media, South Australia. The winners on the night were:

Best Cinematography: Patrick Femia (*Are You Sphongled?*)

Best Editing: Lachlan Bryson and Harrison Copping (*Gun Fight*)

Best Sound: Harrison Thomas (*Isolated*)

Best Film (Preparatory): Joshua Pullino and Charlie Kinniburgh (*The Recipe*)

Best Film (Secondary): Bailey Lock for (*For You*).

The night was a great success and was another example of the growing status of the Performing Arts at Prince Alfred College.

The Film Department would like to thank Acting Academic Leader, Mr Andrew Edge, for his fantastic support of the program throughout the year. We are also grateful to our colleagues in the Performing Arts Department and Mrs Kerry Peterson, in particular, for their continued help and assistance throughout the year. A special thanks goes to Mr Mike Steer for his work in the Year 10 Film and Media program this year, and, as always, we are highly appreciative of the work of Mr Dan Woolford in providing technical assistance and advice in the film lab and Princes TV studio.

We are looking forward to continued success in 2021 and congratulate Myles McEwen on his appointment to the role of Captain of Film for next year.

Science

After a few years of retrospective themes for the Science Journal, the committee, totalling 17 students from Years 7-12 and headed by Chief Editor Joshua Lesicar (Year 12), changed the focus for this year's 76th edition. They felt it would not be just to ignore what has and continues to be one of the most significant events in Science of our lifetime, the COVID pandemic, but they were also keen to look forward to the future. With these key points in mind, they settled on the theme for this year's journal of *A new era for going viral*. Darin Lovett, a current parent and Old Red was the guest author. In his current role as Director at the South Australian Space Industry Centre, Darin wrote of how our state is rapidly establishing a 'vibrant space ecosystem' that will provide a wide array of opportunities for students into the future. The publication included contributions on a range of topics from Years 7-12 students including Artificial Intelligence, Meming of Life, Food Fraud, Jungian Archetypes and Individuation, Quantum Holography and NASA's Artemis Project.

As always, we looked to offer our students opportunities to extend themselves outside of our normal Science program this year. The Science Olympiads, offered for the first time to Years 7-10 students in 2020 as well as to our Year 11s, and the Big Science Competition (Year

7-10) were two such opportunities. We had several students awarded High Distinctions in both, placing them in the top 10% of students in the country who sat these examinations. Unfortunately, we were forced to cancel our planned Forensic Science trip to Spain, just 10 days from our departure date. The nine Year 11s who were partaking in this exciting opportunity were understandably disappointed, but they still gained a great deal from devoting the preparatory work towards this project related to various forensic techniques.

In a new initiative this year we had three of our teachers make lunchtime presentations to the boys titled *Science Snacks*. These presentations were designed to provide the boys with an insight into the lives these teachers had in Science, prior to their pursuing of a career in education. The sessions were all sold out and very well received by the boys. Topics included The Mysteries of Dark Matter, Gene Therapy and Cystic Fibrosis research, Chemistry, Crisps and Concrete.

Another highlight of the year was Ms White's lecture on the Great Proletarian Cultural Revolution which she delivered to both Year 11 IB History classes.

Our success in various History competitions continued with Archie McEwen selected as a Premier's ANZAC Spirit Prize winner for 2020 for his brilliant essay on PAC old scholar, John Godlee. Archie subsequently participated in a study tour around Australia with a focus on Australian history. Alex Titus was a finalist in the National History Challenge and was commended on his entry which was an analysis of post-colonial Sri Lanka.

Certainly, it was a year history will not forget but we look forward to more propitious times.

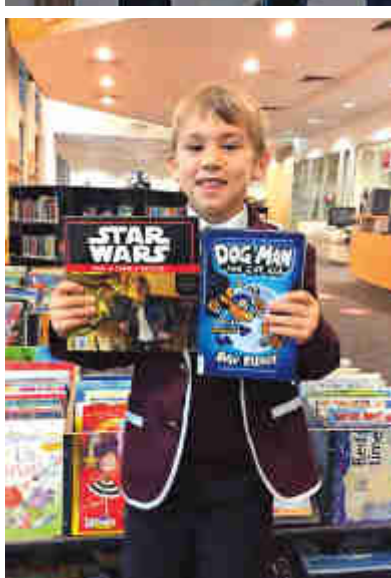

Cricket

When people reflect on this cricket season and 2020 in general, it will be impossible not to overlook the world events that have understandably overshadowed the sport. Aside from missing the last few rounds, which would have included Senior finals and Intercol at all year levels, it was the cancellation of our planned cricket tour of England not long before our scheduled departure which was most disappointing. It is important that we take this opportunity to recognise the progress that has been made by many students and the collective achievements recorded in an almost completed season.

At the beginning of the season, some key coaching appointments were made; Mr Shannon Tubb to First XI, Mr Tom Rutherford to our Middle School First XI, and Mr Russell Thompson as Prep Cricket Co-ordinator. The impact these coaches have made in their respective areas has been significant.

In First XI cricket, Shannon's influence opened the boys up to a more professional learning environment, introducing his knowledge and experience of high performance programs to the students. The results were immediately apparent. Our First XI were the standout school team in the Messenger Shield, finishing top of the table after the minor rounds before the finals were cancelled due to the pandemic.

Our Middle School space has been completely redesigned under the leadership of coaches Mr Tom Rutherford and Mr Keagan English. Prior to the 2019-20 season, we operated a development squad model, where players from various year levels were chosen by the coach to train together. We discovered from this model that the learning environment was disconnected from the match environment and that the squad needed to become a team in order for the learning to have context. So we introduced a more transparent and objective trial process and then entered the team into the 9A competition, giving them weekly opportunities to train and play together. The team was successful on the field, winning all but one match and we will look to extend them further in the 2020-21 season. Development of our Middle School students was not limited to those selected in the MSFXI. After five or six players from 8A or 9A were now being selected in the MSFXI team, opportunities were then created for other players who previously would have missed out on A-level selection or would only play minor roles in A-level sides. They now had a genuine opportunity to be a match-winner under the leadership of coaches Mr Chris Drew and Mr Angas Marshall. It was excellent to see the boys stand up and take ownership of their new roles.

Mr Russell Thompson's vast coaching experience has been called upon to implement Greg's philosophy of teaching skills in the context of a game to our Prep students.

Now, when players learn a new skill, it is developed first in isolation before being immediately put into context. This leads to inbuilt awareness of the risk versus reward decision making required in a competitive environment.

After a turbulent year of much uncertainty, it will be terrific to have the boys back playing cricket again in Term 4 and I am looking forward to seeing them all progress as the season unfolds. Thanks to all who have supported the program in 2020, and congratulations to those Year 12 students who have finished their cricketing journey at Princes. I wish you all much success and hope that you take your love of the game with you for many years to come.

First XI

The Prince Alfred College First XI finished the minor round matches with a 9-1 win-loss record placing us on top of the ladder going into the finals. In the Saturday 40-Over competition the boys played a consistent team game with every boy contributing to a winning formula. Superbly captained by Solomon Musster, the team was undefeated going into the summer break. In every match the top order batsmen performed, and this enabled the team to consistently bat the allocated 40 overs. The bowlers also bowled well as a team and consistently created problems for opposition batsmen.

The season began with a victory over a strong Sacred Heart Second XI. Chasing 9/217 the Princes top order put in a strong performance, achieving the target with thirteen overs to spare and five wickets in hand.

In the next match the boys comprehensively outplayed Pembroke, who were bowled out for 70 which the Princes batsmen chased down in twenty overs and seven wickets in hand.

The match against Westminster saw the Princes batsmen dominate the opposition bowlers and compile a score of 4/247. The bowlers

then put the Westminster team under pressure to hold them to a score of 9/158. The final match of the term was against St Peter's College Second XI. Batting first the Princes batsmen worked hard against a disciplined St Peter's College bowling line up. The final score after 40 overs was 8/169. Once again, the Princes bowlers performed well, dismissing St Peter's College for 137 runs.

Term 1 cricket for the Second XI saw the continuation of the impressive form shown in the previous year. The first match was against a strong Scotch College Second XI. Once again, a strong performance with both bat and ball resulted in a comfortable win for the Princes team. Blackfriars Priory School were the next opponent but were no match for a dominant Princes team; bowled out for 66 in the 32nd over. Our batsmen achieving the required runs in the thirteenth over.

Against Christian Brothers College First XI, the Princes batsmen scored 8/241. Christian Brothers then put up a spirited run chase, but in the end, they struggled against our spinners who took seven wickets between them, including the last six dismissals.

In February, we competed in the School Team Championships at the Marion Aquatic Centre. This competition is a relay focused meet. Basketball

PAC basketball continues to build on the success of 2018 and 2019 and had a range of excellent individual and team achievements. We were also pleased to retain many of our coaches and we appointed a number of new coaches as well, led by the head coaching group of Mr Paul Rigoni, Mr Stuart Brennan and Mr Brandon Reynolds. Once again, professional coach Mr Liam Flynn was involved in the PAC basketball program this year and ran a number of specialist sessions for our Middle and Senior School teams.

There were some outstanding individual performances throughout 2020 which must be acknowledged; Lewis Rowe, Matthew Thomson, Luca Barei, Robbie Brennan, Josh Clifton, Alex Curtis, Trasen Pickett-Carbine and Henry Belcher were all selected in South Australian squads between Under-16 and Under-20. In 2020, Honours Colours were awarded to Lewis Rowe, Matthew Thomson and Robbie Brennan, while Colours were awarded to Oscar Clark, Luca Barei, Alex Curtis and Josh Clifton.

Despite the associated challenges with the COVID-19 pandemic, PAC fielded 17 basketball teams across the Preparatory, Middle and Senior Schools this year and all teams have had successful seasons. Prince Alfred College hosted the Year 5/6 competition and our three teams were once again coached by our Senior basketball leaders – Lewis Rowe and Matthew Thomson (Co-Captains of Basketball) and Oscar Clark (Vice-Captain of Basketball). All three boys have done a commendable job working with our next generation of players. The PAC Senior School teams fielded a range of new players from Year 10-12, all of whom added to the depth and positive culture of basketball at PAC. Football

Season 2020 has been unique. Initially, the program began to unfold like any other. Change was inevitably going to emerge through a restructuring of the major roles related to the program and especially through a new appointment for both the Co-ordinator position, as well as for the First XVIII coaching role. Surprisingly, these changes, although significant, proved to have less impact initially than what was about to unfold.

The season began to operate under familiar circumstances. The First XVIII commenced earlier than usual in order to enable all players to access a fresh start and build their First XVIII prospects in a milieu of equal opportunity. Trainings took place from Week 3 in Term 1 with the boys working hard from the crack of dawn as they completed fitness and skill components desperately aiming to emerge from a pack of 70 players who shared a similar mind set. Within a four-week period, the squad had been reduced to 50 players and this would represent our First XVIII training squad from which the First and Second XVIII teams would be constructed.

As internal trials quickly approached us and the usual procedures were put in place to prepare for a tour to Melbourne to compete against our interstate rivals Wesley College, our leadership positions were constructed through the players voicing their opinions as they voted for who would lead college football for season 2020. Unfortunately, at this point the football season, as well as all other sports, ground to a halt. As the COVID-19 Pandemic swept across the state, country and world, we were forced to experience an impact like no other on sport and life in general. Training sessions were abandoned and summer Intercol was put on hold. All State competitions were cancelled with no alternate plan for the elite players of the state. The potential for a year without a football season loomed and sadly enough for some parts of the country, this became a reality. It was important to remain optimistic in relation to salvaging whatever we could of our season and therefore, all PAC teams were sent a 14 day online training program with video footage to help them maintain and build on their fitness, strength and skills while supporting the current restrictions that were in place. The boys were instructed to complete the program twice, enabling them to achieve a demanding one month of conditioning across all major areas.

The football season was back on and immediately training sessions began to take shape under strict conditions. Although there could be no contact and social distancing rules would apply, we were able to return to working on a number of fundamental development areas and we were forced to become creative in how we trained, with pool noodles being introduced to ensure that pressure and decision making work could still become a feature of sessions. A gradual progression towards the intended training regime would then roll out.

Coaches were finally aligned to their teams with some new additions to the coaching group: Karl Finlay (2019 First XVIII Captain) and Austin Kitschke (2019 First XVIII player) would return to the college to co-coach a Year 7 team. Mr Steven Pollock and Mr Mark Jenkin (Old Scholar) would take control of our Year 8 teams. The very passionate Mr Pat Noonan would take on the head role with our Year 9A team. Mr Jack Read and Mr Harry Hodby (Old Scholars) would work together to drive our 10A2 boys. Mr Jonathon Brice would roll straight into a coaching role with our 10B boys, teaming up with Mr Sam Evans to steer the group. Mr Josh Clarke would also put his hand up for a role coaching our fourth XVIII team after enjoying his time coaching cricket at the college throughout the summer.

Although we were unable to proceed with our Year 8 and First XVIII matches and tours against Wesley, we were fortunate enough to introduce a couple of new additions to the program. The Year 9A team was entered into the State Knockout competition, achieving two strong wins against Heathfield and Adelaide High school in Round 1. They unfortunately were unable to progress further than Round 2 as they came up against a talented and very physical Sacred Heart side. Although disappointment was clearly evident, this was a great experience for the boys and one we will aim to include as a feature of the Year 9 program in the future.

In addition to this, a number of our Senior teams (First, Second and Fourth XVIII) experienced a mid-week game being played in the afternoon on a Wednesday in Round 3. The alteration enabled many of our boarders to play their games but still go home for Exeat, and our Second XVIII were able to play in front of our home crowd as the numbers continued to build on completion of the school day. The First XVIII were able to get an early look at the quality of the Henley High School team through incorporating them into our fixture and avoiding a bye weekend at the same time.

Major highlights and positive initiatives from the season included:

Strong wins at Intercol for our Second and Third XVIIIs, 10A, 10A2, 9A, 8A and Year 6 teams. A commanding performance enabled us to draw a lot of confidence in the notion that PAC football is very well placed for the up and coming years.

Our First XVIII, although depleted with numerous long-term injuries, was able to effectively rebuild after Intercol and produce what was the most outstanding team effort for the season with a 15-point victory

over Henley High school in the State Knockout Grand Final. This was a remarkable result and James Borlase was exceptional all game at Centre Half Back, taking out the Colin Steinert medal for best on ground.

Other initiatives included: the incorporation of a strength and conditioning program for Year 10 and for the First XVIII squad, player education nights on site with Mr Jack Trengove featuring as a special guest speaker; a strong connection to our younger players through our Senior boys driving the Friday afternoon Auskick sessions and through signing replica footballs each week to present to our prep schoolboys to acknowledge positive team characteristics and values aligning to that of a Princes Man.

In a season of constant change, it was crucial to display an ability to quickly adapt, while learning to be creative and flexible. With this came numerous challenges, however, the professionalism displayed by many of our behind the scenes workers was exceptional and I commend all of you on your consistent hard work towards ensuring that the football season continued to drive hard forward and achieve the successful outcomes that were experienced by those involved. Thanks go to the Principal, Mr Bradley Fenner for his strong desire to push on, to Mr Troy McKinnon and Mr Paul Brown for the guidance provided in the lead up, during and post season. The support was essential and very much appreciated. We thank Mrs Deb Trengove for remaining on top of the logistical side of the program. It would have been a frustrating year, but you continued to push through each challenge until you achieved the desired result. To all our dedicated coaches, many of whom were first time coaches, we say thank you. I commend you on your abilities to stay committed to the cause and to move with the times to ensure that progress was consistent and that the boys' needs were always met.

Thank you to all parents and carers. Your support and assistance was fantastic. We reserve a special mention for those who assisted with the BBQs on our home games and to those who sent through the helpful photos after the season. The boys really valued using the clear visuals to reflect on the season.

Finally, to all the players, I am really impressed with you all on the way you approached this season and how you managed to continue without letting the impacts of the climate at the time dictate your behaviour or level of commitment. Your focus and dedication to the football program was exceptional. Look after yourselves and keep working hard as we quickly head towards a new season with what hopefully resembles a lot more normality and even more opportunity for life experiences.

First XVIII

The coaching staff involved were as Head Coach, Mr Matthew Slade, Assistant Coaches Mr Craig Tasborski, Mr Mitchell Simpson, Mr Peter Hopkins and Mr Joel Thiele with Strength and Conditioning the responsibility of Mr Sean Baker.

Our First XVIII Squad was initiated in Week 2 of Term 1. Year 10 – 12 students registered their interest in being a part of this squad by attending a lunch time workshop explaining how the program would be structured in season 2020 and the emphasis on core principles and expectations was clearly defined.

A squad of 70 hit the track to push their cases forward and this was reduced to 50 after 5 weeks of training which covered key areas relating to level of fitness, skills development, disposal efficiency and decision making as well as development of general awareness in relation to the main principles of play.

Training sessions kicked off in Week 3 of Term 1 with 6:45am starts. The boys would arrive in the dark to complete their warm-ups and close range skills and then complete running and skills work as soon as visibility allowed us to do so.

We progressively refined the side and began preparing for some of the usual pre-season clashes. A game against Port's Indigenous Academy and a tour to Melbourne to play Wesley College was on the agenda until COVID-19 impacted on the program and sporting life across the country. Training ground to a halt and the fear of cancelling the season became a very likely reality. Neither game took place. All State programs were terminated. This was a devastating outcome for many of our top end players, as they strove to improve their drafting prospects. Fortunately, South Australian conditions improved, allowing training sessions to resume. By Term 2 Week 3 the program was back up and running and although the structure of sessions became restricted, we were able to work on a number of key developmental areas as we progressively restored our intended training structure. We focused on Train to Develop (Tuesday) and Train to Win philosophy (Thursday). Mr Sean Baker (PEAQ Fitness) was injected into the program to educate and further drive the boys to become the fittest and most physical side in the competition. Sean worked with one third of the group in a rotational format on each Tuesday session.

Our First XVIII football program was designed to develop the boys in a range of areas, with an emphasis on being inclusive and giving back. These characteristics and values were developed through appreciating all members of the squad and encouraging all players to take a lead role when the time presents itself or the opportunity arises. Ensuring that a strong connection was made with our younger players at the college was also a priority of the program and it was essential for the players' own personal development. All of this played a role in creating an extremely positive football culture.

The boys completed an educational night at the end of Term 1, with Mr Daniel Healy from Leading Teams driving the workshop. Mr Luke Dixon (Head Physio) delivered some background on why injuries occur and how we can better condition ourselves to reduce the potential of injuries occurring. Mr Jack Trengove kindly joined our night with an on the couch session which touched on AFL life, balancing school and football, leadership positions in the AFL and dealing with injury setbacks. Everyone greatly valued Jack's insight and it couldn't have been more relevant to the boys considering that Jack is a PAC Old Scholar.

A player's night involved watching the footy on the big screen in the McBride room and a high-quality table tennis doubles and singles competition took place. Each year 12 was randomly paired with a Year 11 to further establish the cohesion of our squad.

Novelty footy balls were signed after each 1st XVIII game, and delivered to our Prep school teams to establish a connection and promote positive team values aligning with those of a Princes Man. Mr Tom Zorich from Sports Power kindly donated the balls. On Friday afternoons in Term 3, the boys gave up their time to help drive the Auskick program as they ran small group activities to help develop our younger players.

A player dinner leading into State Knock Out was arranged to ensure that the boys spent some time together in a relaxed environment to enhance the bonding process but without the usual pressures of a training session.

Finally, Sunday mornings were dedicated to rehabilitation with an early morning post match briefing, a slow jog and stretch, followed by a pool session which the leadership group eventually conducted.

From a performance perspective, the question must be asked: Was it the perfect season? The answer would be no, if you purely base that on wins. If we are looking to learn, develop and grow, then maybe it was yes. Through Intercol we learned that there are no guarantees in football and life and you have to stay focused, composed and continue

to work hard. When things get tough, that's when voice and leaders are crucial. It's easier to emerge when things are going well but when the pressure is on, strong characters will stand up and these are the times we should all aspire to rise and steer those around us. I have personally learned the pain of two Grand Final losses and although it's hard to swallow at the time, it was crucial for success in the years following provided that learning took place and action was then activated. The team was able to fight through this disappointment effectively and they pulled together to re-build and I am confident that we developed a stronger character and this resulted in a tighter and more productive team as a result of this experience.

We displayed our talent, commitment and superior work rate in our convincing wins and we learnt pain and how to re-build quickly, picking ourselves up from a loss. We also experienced the power of relying on everyone and there being no small roles. A gut busting team effort was delivered in the State Knockout Grand Final and it couldn't have come at a better time. Everyone strongly contributed throughout the game and we wouldn't have won and enjoyed the success it brought without this collective contribution.

Round 1 V Rostrevor – Seven Players played their first game of First XVIII Football. One of those was Harry McInnes, a late entry after Hugo Kelly failed to get through Thursdays training due to an injury in the SANFL created by one of his own PAC team-mates. Harry would go on to kick six goals on debut. After a tough early tussle, we would run away with a 93-point victory. Captain, Luke Pedlar displayed his power and dominance around goals. Lucas Schultz and Mitch Thiele suffered long term injuries that would challenge their abilities to return to the side.

Round 2 V Pembroke – Our first home match was our only game to host a post-game presentation for both teams. Mitch Searle played his first game. Pembroke flew out of the blocks kicking the first major but their only one for the game. We gained a 161-point victory with Harry Tunkin taking the honours on the day, while Tyrell Sgroi slotted 4 majors.

Round 3 V Henley High – This was a new addition to the competition with a mid-week game against Henley High, who normally wouldn't have featured until the end of the year. It took the boys half a game to get going, forcing us to bridge a solid gap in the second half, which was fortunately achieved. A 16-point victory resulted with Ben Larsson tremendous over four quarters and Lewis Cowham crucial to igniting the side in the second half. Harry McInnes also impacted the score board heavily with another six. Jamison Murphy would also play his last game for the season and turn his focus to coaching as the backline (defensive) line coach.

Round 4 V Sacred Heart – Aston Woods initiated his First XVIII career. In a challenging first quarter we gave away too much space early. Physicality and work rate picked up in the second and a strong finish was achieved with a 26-point win. Harlee Chandler played a pivotal role in the midfield and Luke Pedlar was inspirational on almost one leg. Sadly enough, this became Luke's final game for the College season.

Round 5 V Westminster – There was another slow start against a very physical and determined Westminster outfit. Kallis Freer emerged in game 1 as acting captain and was dynamic as he led by example. Josh Garrels also put together a performance warranting attention with his impressive work rate and three goals. A 36-point victory went to the Reds.

Round 6 V St Michaels – Our final home game was the last game our Year 12s would play on home soil. An exhibition in football was put on by the lads. A 117-point victory emerged. Willa Taylor was impressive.

Harry McInnes bagged five majors. James Borlase also played his first League game for Sturt (SANFL) and featured high in the best players.

Round 7 V Immanuel – This fixture produced a display of superiority in all facets of the game from start to finish. The boys finished with a 136-point win and were never really challenged throughout the game. Harry McInnes and Lucas Schultz combined for 12 goals. There was another strong performance by interim captain Kallis Freer. Will Charlton and Pat Singleton were dynamic across half back and Hugo Kelly took mark of the year. Willa Taylor was concussed and sadly took no further part in the season as a player.

Round 8 Intercol – One we would all like to forget. Some strong lessons were learned in a test of character as well as some real ground gained in personal development. There was an emotional finish with a 20-point loss in a game that never really got going. Some inaccurate kicking early impacted our ability to put St Peter's College under pressure. Harlee Chandler and Jake Bilsborow worked hard across four quarters.

State Knockout Final – A massive challenge was set in order to rebuild after Intercol, with spirits well and truly flattened. The week was spent with a progressive building of mood and confidence and emphasis was placed on there being no small roles and relying heavily and equally on the collective. Josh Garrels sustained an ankle injury which ruled him out for the game. The good luck story of the year emerged with Henry Kleinig playing his first and last game for season 2020 and PAC in general. All the stops were pulled out with Uncle John giving us a smoking ceremony outside the PAC changerooms before our departure to Thebarton Oval. A hard-fought team effort resulted in a 15 point victory. James Borlase was commanding across half back and rightfully earned The Colin Steinert medal for best on ground. Harry Tunkin was not far behind him with a gut busting, polished performance across the four quarters.

As a result, the College determined that a general discount to all families, along with targeted support to families directly impacted by the pandemic, would be provided to enable all current students to continue their education at PAC.

As our families were impacted so too were our staff. In order to manage the impact in the early days of the shutdown a number of non-teaching staff were stood down. Whilst the College provided support, and the shutdown was for a very short period, there were many staff who were impacted. As I said to staff members at the end of last year it is to their credit that when the doors opened again they came back to work with the same passion, pride and commitment as they'd had prior to the stand down. The College is indeed very lucky to have such a loyal and dedicated team.

Whilst the actions taken to support our community during COVID-19 had a short-term negative financial impact on the College there have been no long-term effects. PAC is in a very strong position to continue to invest in the College infrastructure and to support the ambitions of our next Strategic Plan which is currently being finalised.

You will have read the recent correspondence from College Council regarding the fee increase for 2021 and I want to provide some background to give context to this increase and our view for future increases. The College looks to offset the inflationary impacts on our

expenses through either cost savings, where these costs savings do not have a detrimental impact on the programs we provide, or through fee increases. For 2021 our average fee increase is 1.67% and it is our lowest fee increase for many years. Whilst we have some challenges in setting future fee increases due to changes in government funding our goal is to ensure we always maintain our fee increase around CPI and that fee increases are maintained year on year within a narrow band.

Finally, I want to highlight some of the work that took place over the Christmas break. This included the remodeling of the Art spaces in the old gymnasium and significant renovation of some of the Preparatory classroom spaces. These new spaces provide effective teaching and learning environments for staff and students. The long breaks provide a useful opportunity for our non-teaching team to complete the regular maintenance of both our facilities and grounds and along with our housekeeping team they prepared the College to a high standard for the return of both the students and teaching staff. The whole non-teaching team are a wonderful asset and contribute significantly to the culture we have here at PAC.

Prince Alfred College is a good community to be part of and we have much to look forward to in 2021 with an ambitious Capital Program that will result in many dynamic additions and improvements to our facilities as well as to the educational programs we offer.

Bequests

Marjorie Hassell Bequest

Mrs Marjorie 'Spook' Hassell died in 2018 and left a bequest to the College to increase the endowment of the Colin Hassell Scholarship. Her bequest has now been received and members of the Hassell family joined with the Headmaster, Council Chair, Foundation President and recipients past and present of the Colin Hassell Scholarship, for morning tea in the Ashton Room to commemorate her gift.

A little over a decade ago Spook conceived the idea of a scholarship in memory of her husband Colin Hassell AO (1928). Throughout the remainder of her long-life Mrs Hassell took great interest in the establishment and implementation of the Colin Hassell Scholarship, but most importantly she came to know the first four recipients and gained much pleasure from having done so.

The College thanks Marjorie 'Spook' Hassell and the Hassell family for their generosity to, and continued interest in, Prince Alfred College. Due to their extraordinary support, many, many students, will continue to benefit from the Colin Hassell Scholarship endowment, into the foreseeable future and beyond.

John P. Keeves Bequest

During the year the Foundation was saddened by the death of Professor John Keeves AM (1942) who was the first Captain of the Preparatory School, a Prefect and staff member. The Foundation gives thanks for the long life and distinguished career of John Keeves

and acknowledges his generous bequest towards building projects at the College.

Torrie Chapman Bequest Endowment

The funds received through the estate of the late Mrs Torrie Chapman have been applied in three areas within our endowment: the Edward Hunt Boarding Scholarships, the Torrie Chapman Tertiary Scholarships and the Mundulla Fund. In 2020 the Edward Hunt Scholarship has supported nine boarding students from farming backgrounds, and the Torrie Chapman Scholarships support four Old Scholars undertaking tertiary studies relevant to careers in the agricultural sector. The Mundulla Fund supports special programs and activities for current students in agriculture-related areas. Mrs Chapman's generosity in helping to provide significant opportunities for both current students and Old Scholars through this major bequest to our endowment will ensure that this continues in perpetuity.

Wilfred Cooper Engineering Scholarship

The Wilfred Cooper Engineering Scholarship was presented to Lachlan Crawford (2018) by Glenn Cooper AM (1968) at a ceremony at the College. Stuart is the eleventh Old Scholar to be awarded the scholarship which recognises academic achievement in a first year Engineering course at the University of Adelaide.

Grandies Club

Normally the College proudly presents many opportunities for Grandies to visit us and to take part in the lives of their boys, and Grandies Days and Grandies' Club activities are strongly supported. For the most part scheduled Grandies activities were unable to occur in 2020 and it is hoped the College will be better placed to host this special group of people in 2021.

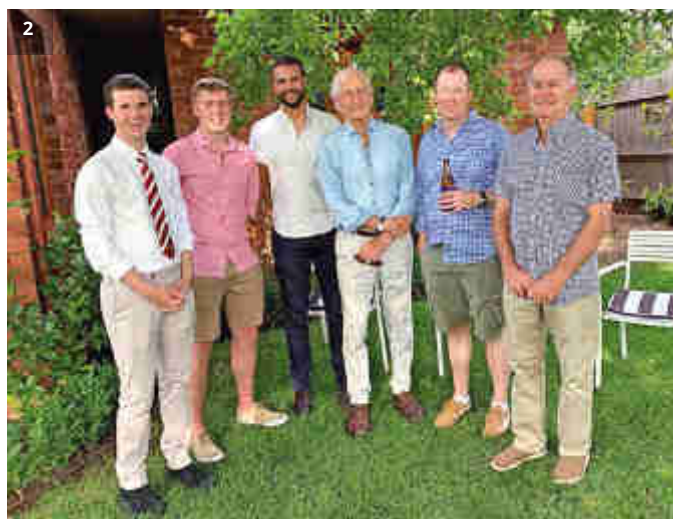

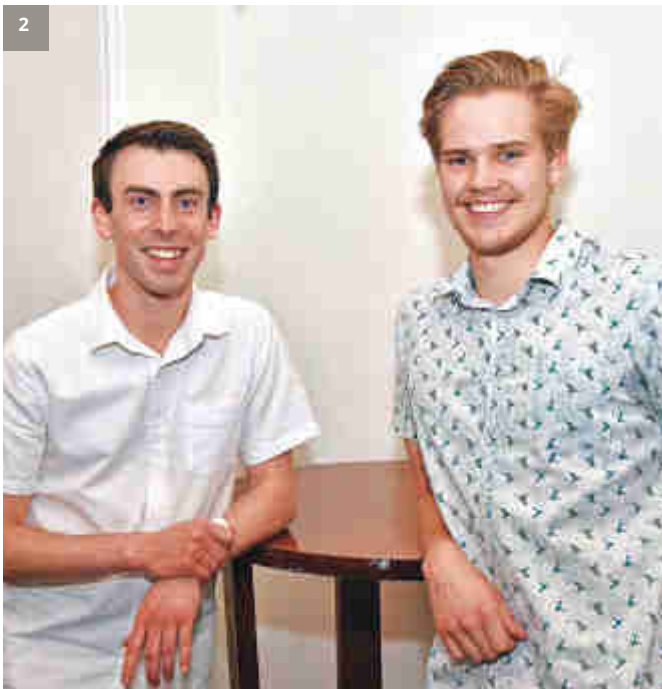

2020 was a season like no other for the Prince Alfred Old Collegians Football Club. After a largely uneventful preseason under new coach Craig Pitt (2009), the season was placed on hold due to COVID-19. All within the football community were relieved when an abbreviated nine game season was announced that commenced in July 2020.

Despite the long delay in commencing the season, the Club still fielded four teams in the Adelaide Footy League with interest as strong as ever when we resumed. The depth of the Club was on show early, with all teams getting off to an impressive start and showing they would be contenders at season's end.

Our A Grade won its first three games, which included strong victories against eventual grand finalists Rostrevor Old Collegians and Goodwood Saints. The evenness of the competition was on show each week, with strong wins against Unley Mercedes Jets and Athelstone being offset by defeats to Payneham Norwood Union and Brighton Bombers.

Unfortunately, we suffered numerous injuries through the middle of the season. This included three star recruits in Jack Trengove (2009), Cameron Giles (2013) and Bryce Woolard (2014) who would all miss our finals series.

The season was so close that if we won our final two games we would finish top, and if we lost them both we would miss finals. A loss in Round 8 to St Peter's Old Collegians left us with a must win final round

game against Port District. In that contest, the side rallied from four goals down at half time to win by six goals and secure third spot on the ladder.

The first round of finals saw the team travel to Goodwood Saints. The team dominated for large parts of the game but bad kicking resulted in a final score of 5.18 (48) to 8.12 (60), a 12 point loss. The second week of finals did not go any better with an impressive Rostrevor Old Collegians outclassing us all day and progressing in the finals series.

Thomas Bartlett (2005) had an impressive season and was awarded the Ross C Johnston Trophy as A Grade Best and Fairest. Jack Trengove and William Dalwood (2006) tied for runner up. Cameron Pritchard (2014) received the Coaches Trophy while Thomas Brinsley (2008) was awarded Player of the Finals. Riley Robinson (2017) locked away his position in the side and received the Most Improved Award.

The B Grade, coached again by James Dalwood (2002), had a very up and down season. They finished the minor round with four wins and five losses, managing to get fifth spot on the ladder and a place in the finals. The side showed glimpses of its potential throughout the year, with the highlight being an impressive upset win over Port District in the last round of the season to secure their finals spot.

The side was in form at the right time of the year and secured an impressive win in the Elimination Final against Unley Mercedes Jets in the first round of the finals. Unfortunately, bad kicking got the better of them in the second week of finals and they lost by 10 points to Port District.

Brendan Papps (2006) and Jock Piper (2018) were the two standout players from the season. They shared the Player of the Finals Award, while Brendan took out the Best and Fairest and Jock was runner up. Brodie Henderson (2018) was awarded the Coaches Trophy. Ross Porter's (2019) impressive first season saw him acknowledged with the Rookie of the Year Award while Benjamin Siebels (2014) started in the C Grade but was a constant vote getter in the B Grade by season's end and was awarded the Ron M Carter Award for most votes across all grades.

The C Grade were the dominant side throughout the minor round, finishing Minor Premiers of their competition. However, the finals' series did not go to plan for coach James Freemantle (1994) and the side was knocked out in straight sets, with losses against Goodwood Saints and Adelaide University.

Hamish Porter (2017) was impressive all season and won the Best and Fairest with Thomas Gray (2012) runner up. Hugo Chapman (2015) caught the eye of the umpires up forward and took out the C1 League Best and Fairest Medal while also winning the Club Leading Goal Kicker Award. Francis 'Max' Drogemuller (2018) won the Coaches Trophy, while Timothy Sanders (1994) was Player of the Finals.

The D Grade, under co-coaches Nicholas Pemberton (2004) and Scot Tyndall (2004), made it the perfect season, reaching finals by finishing the minor round in fourth position. The side was in good form heading into finals and achieved victories over Rostrevor Old Collegians and Tea Tree Gully to make it to the Preliminary Final. Golden Grove were too strong in that game but the side can be very proud of its efforts throughout the year.

Stuart Brennan (2016) was the standout performer of the season, winning the Best and Fairest, and Player of the Finals. Luca Corradini (2019) was runner up, and Jack Christensen (2017) was awarded the Coaches Trophy.

Off the field the Club unfortunately could not celebrate its usual events such as Ladies Day and Past Players Day. However, supporters were allowed at games, and each week we had great crowds which was appreciated by the players.

We had a reduced capacity for the end of season dinner but were still able to celebrate the season. Luke Bartlett (2014) was acknowledged as having become eligible for Life Membership. Thomas Brinsley received the Best Club Man Award, while Rupert Johnston (2016) and William Dalwood were joint recipients of the Headmaster's Award, acknowledging all three for their significant contribution to the year.

The wider Committee should also be acknowledged for their hard work in navigating through COVID-19 restrictions and putting in the extra hours required to ensure the season could go ahead. Special mention must go to James Parkinson (1977) and the Football Operations team for their work.

Despite the COVID-19 disruption of 2020, the hockey season was still able to get underway and be completed. This seemed only a very slim chance of happening back in March, when on the day of our first pre-season training Hockey SA sent out notification as to the indefinite postponement of the season and ordering the cessation of all training. Thankfully, as the weeks and months passed, the situation in South Australia appeared to be well under control and planning took place around the return of sport and of hockey. Training recommenced in June and Round 1 finally took place on the weekend of 20 June.

We were competing in the Metro 2s Division, which had a reduction in the number of teams entered in it this year due to COVID. Seven teams entered in the division resulting in the season being 14 rounds with two games against each team plus two bye rounds. As the season progressed, it became apparent there were two teams likely in the hunt for the flag, us and Port Adelaide. We would come up against them for the first time of the season in Round 4, with both teams going in undefeated. Our undefeated run included our leading striker Sam Tyler (2001) completing a hat-trick of hat-tricks in the first three rounds of the season. Unfortunately, Port came out victors in the Round 4 battle, beating us 2-0 on our home pitch at St Peter's. This was our first minor round loss since Round 3 in the 2017 against Adelaide Hockey Club. An amazing run to go from Round 4 2017 to Round 3 2020 undefeated in minor round games. It was also our first ever loss on our adopted home pitch of St Peter's since we started playing there in 2017. We came out of this loss spinning it as a positive that it was 'the loss we had to have' and took some solace from the fact we had a few key players missing that game so should be stronger against them the next time.

We would have some revenge on Port in the return fixture in Round 11 this year, beating them 2-1 with an impressive performance on their home pitch. The result was especially pleasing as it came after losing one of our players, Damen Guest, a few weeks prior. Damen has been a key player for us in recent seasons, directing traffic from the back half of the pitch and launching us into attacking plays. Halfway through this season, Damen and his family returned home to WA and we knew at the time we would miss his presence both on and off the pitch. Despite this, we were able to back fill his role to some extent and secure the win against Port.

Both teams would head into finals with 11 wins, one loss and no draws. With Port finishing on top of the ladder on goal difference by only one goal across the season. We would take them on in a high quality battle in the first week of finals in a semi-final at Adelaide Uni. We were 3-2 up but then had two players off the ground on green cards. Port took full advantage and put in two goals while we were down in numbers to go ahead 3-4 with about three minutes of play to go. We couldn't drag one back and they ran out one goal victors at full time. Despite being very disappointed with the result, we took positives out of the game in that we thought we had the better of the game.

The Peckers players and supporters were pumped up after they managed the first goal of the game to put us on our heels a bit. This seemed

to be the wake-up call we needed, as from there we went about controlling possession, controlling the game and playing more on our terms. We got a goal back to level the game. Then once we went 2-1 up it seemed a shift in mindset from Woodville and from us: they knew they were going to lose; we knew we were going to win. The score went 3-1, then 4-1, then 5-1 before half time arrived. The goals were spread around, with one each to Will Phillips (2004), Liam Rippon (2018), James Risby (2010), Derek Lee and Sam Tyler (2001). The pace of the second half wasn't quite at the level of the first half. Both teams struggled to break through and there was probably a bit of fatigue from the sun setting in. But the scoring deadlock in the second half would be broken by another Matt Bruorton special—on a fair angle on the right-hand side just inside the attacking circle with a drag onto the back stick and rifling the tomahawk shot into the far corner net. An exact replica of his goal against Port in the previous final. This made the final score on 6-1 over Woodville, booking our spot in a blockbuster Grand Final against Port.

Unfortunately, with the Grand Final taking place uniquely on a Sunday afternoon, we didn't get the result we were after. Port took what was our pre-game plan and inflicted it upon us. They burst out of the blocks and took every opportunity that came their way, netting three goals in the first ten minutes of the game to put us really behind the eight-ball. To the credit of the team, no one thought we were out of it at that stage. We were confident that we could outrun them over the length of the game and, with some luck, reel in the score. This started to look less likely as Port extended their lead to 4-0. A glimmer of hope came for us before half time when we put in our first goal to make it 1-4 at the break. This gave us a bit of impetus going into the break. The talk at half time centred around a 'nothing to lose now' attitude for the second half. Port's effort did not fall away, and they scored the first goal of the second half to prevent us building some momentum and a chance of running over the top of them. We did answer back with a goal to make it 2-5 but time was running out and Port's defence was holding strong. As a final dagger, Port scored a sixth goal that rebounded between our goalkeeper and off a defender to trickle across the goal line almost

comically. This, in some ways, summed up the game for us with most things going right for Port and most things going wrong for us. Will Phillips and Matt Bruorton were some of the better players for us on the day. Our two goals came through Bruorton and Derek Lee. The full-time score was 2-6 in Port's favour. The team enjoyed celebrating together on the Sunday night despite the loss.

As far as the history books go, this is the first losing grand final for the Club since the 1999 Division 2 (now known as Metro 1s) grand final. It has been a very successful period recently for the team, including making finals for six consecutive seasons, playing off in four grand finals in the last five years, and three premierships in four years including back-to-back flags in the Metro 2s Division.

The team scored 57 goals whilst conceding only 11 goals in the minor round season of twelve games. The award winners for 2020 were Sam Tyler collecting the Club Best and Fairest Award for the fifth consecutive year with a division-leading 26 goals for the season, and Michael Staak (2010) being awarded the Best Club Man. Matthew Bruorton was awarded Player of the Finals.

The Club wishes to thank Tom Ricketts (2004) for his ongoing support as sponsor through the Seven Stars Hotel in a particularly tough period with COVID. The team very much enjoys spending their time there after games and at the regular post-training dinners. I would personally like to thank Andrew Baillie (2004), Mark Gobolos (1997) and Michael Staak for their help throughout the season in administration, coaching and training. Next season gets underway in April 2021.

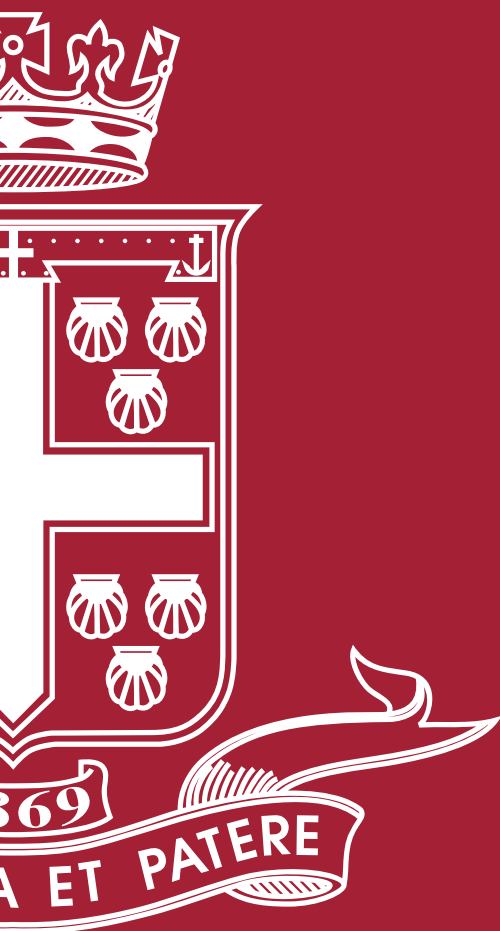

From the Director of Human Resources

The year of 2020 has reinforced for me the many wonderful traits which contribute to the organisational culture at Prince Alfred College. The impact COVID-19 has had on the global employment landscape has been well documented - and whilst we ultimately did not face the widescale disruption, we have required a great deal from all of our employees to adapt and respond to what at times have been extremely rapid changes to the workplace. The grace, commitment, understanding and support shown by all are testament to what a strong positive culture can achieve. I am also conscious that many employees have had family and friends directly impacted. Balancing these concerns with the expectations to deliver an essential service should not be underestimated, and for that I wish to thank everyone for the roles they have played this year. I would also like to thank the HR team, whose dedication and focus have ensured we managed appropriately, and provided timely advice in this new working environment.

The successful renegotiation of a revised College Enterprise Agreement in the latter half of 2019 has been an excellent tool to ensure our industrial requirements are being well met and that there is clarity of criteria for career progression for both teachers and other professional staff. Our compliance requirements are well managed and well understood by all employees. Working with Children Checks, Responding to Abuse and Neglect and First Aid training are some of a number of compliance measures in place. In addition to this, in 2020 formal training in protective practices was again delivered to reinforce our commitment to student and staff wellbeing and safety.

PAC is quite unique in the independent school sector in that we do not outsource any of the key services of the College. This equates to a large and very diverse range of employees working at the College, who all bring specific skills and knowledge. We are confident this model delivers the very best of outcomes and standards. It also provides a key shared value for all employed by the College – decisions are always underpinned with ‘what is in the best interest for the boys’.

The shared pride in wearing the PAC name badge is a very powerful and positive influence on our culture. We welcomed a number of new colleagues during 2020, and unanimously the feedback received is how friendly and welcoming the environment is upon arrival.

Our annual employee engagement survey conducted in November provided a great deal of positive feedback. Access to resources, confidence in future directions, positive relationships with students together with excellent support from colleagues were all highlighted. Archives

The Prince Alfred College Archives is a significant and valuable collection of tangible cultural heritage, which documents the unique history of school life at our College.

This has been an unprecedented year globally. The devastating bushfires early in the year were followed by the COVID-19 pandemic. We are still feeling the effects of both here at Prince Alfred College. The only other time our College closed was in 1938, 1948 and 1949 due to another pandemic, that of Polio.

COVID-19, although disruptive and challenging, has allowed our community time to reflect on their experience of schooling, which has resulted in a reconnection to the memory of College life, whether attendance was five, ten or even fifty years ago.

It is important to acknowledge both good and bad by documenting these school experiences and especially by recording the student voice in our College Archive. With advice from Mrs Fitzhenry, our Captains of Wellbeing Hugo Jordan and Brendan Tomlins and History Journal Captain Liam Hindshaw have led a project to capture images of our 2020 College experience on the path to wellbeing. We have received over 1000 images to date, from ELC to Year 12.

As College Archivist, I hope we will look back on this period of our history with pride in how we bravely managed such challenges, as we had done before. I hope we see that we learned from this period of adversity and worked hard to make our future a brighter place for our students, their families, our staff, our learning models and our community.

Following our very active 150th Sesquicentenary celebrations in 2019, the College Archive has continued to experience a significant draw for information and photographs of our remarkable history.
